THE AGRICULTURAL SHOW.—The annual show of the Agricultural Society of Cape Town will be held in the Government Gardens on Thursday next. Great preparation is being made for the reception of the different competitors. It is expected that the show of cattle, horses, cereals, and produce in general will be very extensive.

ANGORA RAMS.—At the close of the Agricultural Show on Thursday next, 30 pure-bred imported Angora rams will be offered for sale. They have been imported by Messrs. Goodf. S. Smarte and Searle. We have no doubt but that much competition will be shown by those who wish to possess themselves of such fine animals, as it may be a very long time before such an opportunity occurs again.

ROBBERY IN LONG-STREET.—On Thursday night a thief broke into the kitchen of the residence of Mr. Bam, situated in Long-street, and stole a number of articles. Entrance was obtained through the window of the kitchen, the thief breaking a pane of glass and unlatching the window.

LUCK OF A CAPE TOWN PARTY AT THE DIAMOND FIELDS.—Mr. J. C. Wrensch has written from the Good Hope claim at the diamond fields on the 17th of September, having been twentythree days on the road from Mowbray. On the second day he was at work he picked up a black diamond of six or seven carats, valued at £100. He says he had only made a small hole when he found the diamond, and he is sanguine that he has a rich claim, which he will take three months before it can be worked out. He says that he had twenty diamonds in his hand which had been found on an adjoining claim.

THEFT AT WORCESTER.—On Tuesday last, William Vawter, a printer, aged 23 b. m. in Cape Town, was placed before C. B. Cox, Esq., Resident Magistrate of Worcester, and charged with stealing £34 5s., the property of Mr. Thos. Tyers, a shopkeeper. Mr. Tyers said that he had occasionally employed the prisoner to go on errands and collect small accounts, and that early on the previous day he entrusted him with £34 5s., to take to the bank, and that shortly afterwards he discovered that the prisoner had absconded with the money. A warrant was granted by the Clerk of the Peace, upon which the prisoner was apprehended about six o'clock in the evening in the Hex River Kloof, with the whole of the money in his possession, with the exception of two shillings that he acknowledged to have spent in the purchase of a pipe and a few cakes. The prisoner confessed his guilt, and was committed for trial.

A BRUTAL AND COLD BLOODED MURDER AT CLANWILLIAM.—A correspondent to a contemporary says: "It appears that a man named Thiant, an overseer on the farm of one D. Kotze, at a place called Byndermeid, in the Namaqualand division, in June or July last lost a cow, he immediately suspected a Hotentot or Bushman named Gert Zwart, who had been at his erf the previous evening, but who had left early the next morning. Thiant sent a Damara servant in search of the lost cow, who traced the spoor to a hill in the division, called Flamingberg, and there saw a fire, smelt roast beef, and heard the knocking of bones on the stones, as if marrow was being knocked out. The servant returned, and informed his master, Thiant, what he had seen the next morning. Thiant, the Damara, and two other servants, went to the hill in order to find the thief, when they arrived there they made an halt, and distributed powder, shot, and caps, and a good dose of brandy to each one. Thiant then told his servants to shoot every one found there. It appears that the party of the supposed thief, Gert Zwart, consisted of one old man, five women and six children, who had arrived there shortly before for the purpose of searching for white ants. The Damara and another servant came upon them first, and called upon them to stop, which they did. Thiant then came up and asked for Gert Zwart, and was told that he was gone ahead. Thiant then told his servants to go and shoot him. Gert Zwart at the time being only a short distance from his party. They went and done as they were told, and brought his gun back to Thiant. They then went to the women and children, who were defenceless, and when within six yards of the poor creatures, by order of Thiant, they began to fire most mercilessly among them, and did not cease until they supposed all had been killed, except one young girl saved by Thiant. The murderers then left for their home. Towards evening the old man and his wife recovered so far as to be able to sit up, when they found their daughter, whose hand had been shattered by a gunshot, was still living. They managed to get to the place of a Bastard, named Cloete, there they met a woman of their party who had escaped in the early part of the slaughter. They went and reported the affair to the fieldcornet, and although it took place in June or July nothing was done to apprehend the rascals, until the Magistrate, W. B. Chalmers, Esq., happened to hear about it a few days ago. The Magistrate then caused Thiant and the Damara to be apprehended and issued warrants for the apprehension of the other two. The murderers killed Gert Zwart, two women, and five children from the age of one to twelve years."

ATTEMPTED MURDER AT SCHRITTOWEN.—Our Resident Magistrate was informed on Wednesday that an attempt at murder had been made by a Bushman at Upper Schietfontein, the property of Thomas Plewman, Esq. He and the District Surgeon went out immediately on hearing the report. The facts appear to be as follows: It seems that the Bushman enticed a Gonnah and his wife to some secluded kopje on the farm. His ostensible object was to show them some wool which he had hidden there. The man and his wife after some time sat down, and the Bushman fixed himself behind them. Shortly after this the Bushman, who had a gun, fired upon the man, the bullet passing through his cheek, carrying off part of the jaw and three teeth on that side, and then passing out through the other cheek. The Gonnah managed to find his way to the farm that evening, but his wife did not appear till the morning, when she informed the people that the Bushman had shot her husband as he was seated. The Gonnah was brought into town and is still in a dangerous condition. The perpetrator has not yet been secured.—*Coleberg Herald.*

REPORTED DEATH OF DR. LIVINGSTONE.—The death of Dr. Livingstone is once more reported, this time from Potchefstroom, and apparently on good authority. Mr. E. Parvey, who arrived in Gonnah's Town on Saturday last from Potchefstroom, says that a regular post has recently been established by the Portuguese Governor, now at Potchefstroom, to Quillimane, and that by this post letters have been received, stating for a positive fact that Livingstone is no more. The news of his death has reached Zambeze.

MALMESBURY DIVISIONAL COUNCIL.—The ordinary monthly meeting of this Council was held in the Court-room Malmesbury, on the 4th of October, 1870. Present.—The chairman (E. S. Ford, C. C.), Messrs. Dueskitt, Moorrees, Hodges, Gird, Bresler, Louw, and Visser. Minutes of previous meeting read and confirmed.

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European News.

THE PRINCE IMPERIAL AT MONS.

It was only towards seven o'clock in the evening that the Prince Imperial, coming from Maastricht, arrived at the station of Mons.

To day the Prince Imperial quitted Namur at 40 minutes past three o'clock, to proceed by Charleroi to Braine-le-Cumme, and from there to return towards Mons, in order to meet the Empress.

Before getting away from Namur the Prince was detained for two hours in the office of the station-master, owing to a succession of contradictory orders.

FRANCE WITH ITS COAT OFF.—The Electeur Libre, the journal of M. Ernest Picard, now Minister of Finance, contains the following account of the military situation:—"Sixty thousand men, composed of General Vinoy's corps and the remnant of M. Mahon's, are concentrating at Laon, ready to march on Paris."

THE FIFTEENTH AND THE SECOND.—On the 2nd of August the French crossed the frontier, and took the heights above Saarbrueck, on the 2d of September the Emperor surrendered to the King. What a fate is in days (says the East Suffolk Gazette). The elder Napoleon's day was the 15th. On a 15th he was born; on a 15th he won the Battle of Aroca, his first great victory; on a 15th he stood on the field of Marengo a conqueror; on a 15th he was driven from Moscow by fire; on a 15th he began an attack on Ilicher, the fighting that ended on the 18th with Waterloo; on a 15th of the following month he surrendered to the captain of the Bellerophon; and on a 15th October he presided St. Helena. The present Emperor on the 2nd December effected the coup d'etat; on a 2nd the Russians crossed the Pruth, and commenced the Crimean war, in which the third Napoleon won so much glory; on a 2nd he declared war against Austria; on a 2nd the Queen left England to meet him at Cherbourg; and on a 2nd he signed a commercial treaty with Prussia; his friend Richard Cobden died on a 2nd; on a 2nd of September the King of Hanover appealed to him against Prussia; on a 2nd began the famous panic of the French Bourse, founded on the Emperor's warlike intentions; on a 2nd he entered Prussia; on a 2nd he surrendered. Of course, these are but coincidences; yet the Emperor is a fatalist, and one cannot help feeling that he and his family have got ample reason to think with the motto of the Russell family, Che Sara Sara. And now he may say to France in the words that Byron puts into the mouth of the oncle de son neveu—"She abandons me now, but the page of her story, The brightest or blackest, is filled with my fame."

ATTACK ON THE SPANISH AMBASSADOR AT PARIS.—In one of the incidents of Sunday, M. de Olazaga, the Spanish ambassador, was intimately concerned. He was proceeding in his carriage, along the Quai d'Orsay, to the Chamber, when the crowd stopped the vehicle and loudly summoned him to alight. He attempted to demonstrate, but the assailants tore off one of the doors and did other damage. Fortunately some Spaniards happened to be near, and energetically affirmed that the occupant was the representative of Spain. All acts of hostility then ceased. M. de Olazaga was able to walk to his hotel, which was not far off, accompanied by a considerable body of people. On arriving there the honorable gentleman said:—"Citizens,—I thank you for the respect you showed me as soon as you learned who I was. In doing so you paid a mark of respect to the country which I represent, and which is a loyal ally of France. I therefore thank you in the name of Spain. As to me, if you follow closely the course of events, you must be aware of the deep interest which I feel for your country. Having said so much, I take leave of you with the cry of 'Vive la France!' These words were received with loud applause."

THE NEW COINAGE ACT.—In the late session an act was passed to consolidate and amend the law relating to coinage, and under it new standard weights are being constructed, and by an order in Council will be enforced, to determine the weight of gold and silver coins. The Chancellor of the Exchequer is declared to be the Master of the Mint. There are two provisions in this statute of importance to persons in trade, and which should be known—"Where any gold coin of the realm is below the current weight as provided by this act, or where any gold coin is called in by any proclamation, every person shall, by himself or others, cut, break, or deface any such coin tendered to him in payment, and the person tendering the same shall bear the loss. If any coin cut, broken, or defaced is not below the current weight, or has not been called in by any proclamation, the person cutting, breaking, or defacing them shall receive it in payment according to its denomination. Any dispute to be determined by a summary proceeding." This act repeals part two, and wholly twenty-two, former statutes on coinage.
