AMID a multitude of absurd schemes and proposals, the Government has at last hit upon one which is likely to operate most beneficially for the Colony. It required £50,000 to keep the Government Machine going, and the Parliament was at first strongly of opinion that that money ought to be raised in England. On second thoughts, however, they assented to its being raised in the Colony, if possible. Tenders for £50,000 on Government debentures were accordingly asked for, and close upon three times the amount was immediately forthcoming, and that too, in most cases, above par, in fact in all cases, with the single exception of one. This is one of the most encouraging signs of progress we have had to communicate to our readers for a long time. It shows that although thousands have in late years had to go to the wall, there are still hundreds left among us, who, notwithstanding the heavy losses they must have necessarily sustained are yet in a position to aid the enterprise, and promote the industry of the Colony. In short, it proves that we have the means within ourselves of rectifying our present temporary difficulties if we only knew how to set about it. It appears there is Capital enough, and there is obviously labor enough to employ that Capital to advantage, but the problem is, and probably for many years will be, to bring realised wealth to bear upon productive industry. We do not certainly expect much of a beneficial character will result from the recent investment; past experience forbids the hope; still, it is infinitely better that our accumulated wealth should be employed, than that it should be allowed to rust, so to say, in the strong boxes of our Colonial Banks. We have hitherto been, to use a familiar simile, hiring a wagon and team from our neighbour, at a very high rate too, to do our transport, all the while that our own oxen, fat as butter, were grazing on the hills, and our wagon and gear safely locked up in the wagon house! This is a kind of economy which we now seem to have outlived, and the sooner it is altogether abandoned, the better it will be for us. This first experiment of issuing Colonial Debentures is in our view fraught with consequences of immense political and social importance. We urged the issue of Colonial Debentures from the very first. We then gave our reasons for our opinion of the desirability of such a measure, and the result has shown that we were perfectly right. There seems, as we then averred, to be no lack of money in the country, and should the system which has now been inaugurated, of funding the national debt, be extended, and the same spiritiveness continue to be shown by our Colonial Capitalists to invest in Government securities, we can foresee a great change for the better in our financial affairs, and that too, at no very distant period. The annual drain of money from the colony in the shape of interest will cease to be an incubus on our progress, and we shall at least have the usufruct of our own capital.

It was speciously but fallaciously urged, that any moneys withdrawn from the ordinary channels would seriously affect existing relations. So far as we can learn, not the slightest inconvenience has been felt by the transference of capital to the purchase of the Government Debentures. We have not heard that a single mortgage bond has been called in for investment in Government stock—not have we learned that good paper is more difficult to discount now, than it was before tenders were advertised. Good negotiable bills as much in demand now, as they were months ago, and not one single branch of colonial industry has suffered from the transfer of money from the Bank coffers to the General Treasury. Had it been that farmers were ruined by their mortgages having been called in—that landed property was thrust upon an unprofitable market—that Joint Stock Company Shares were sacrificed at simply what they would bring,—and that Life Policies were offered at next to nothing in order to raise the fund for Government investment, then we should have entertained a less brilliant hope for the future of the colony than we can well afford to cherish now. But no disturbance whatever has taken place in our monetary relations although the Government is in quiet possession of £50,000, and which surely we have reason to believe, would have been swallowed out to three or four times that amount had they only asked for it. There are thus undoubtedly the *signs* of industry in the colony yet, if they could only be properly and effectually directed.

There is one phase of the question of Colonial Debentures which those who have opposed them throughout, still urge, though it must be confessed feebly; and it is this. They argue that Cape six per cent would fetch, or would have fetched a higher premium on the London Stock Exchange than they have realised here. This may, or may not have been the case had these debentures been opened to public competition there. We are of opinion that they would not—but supposing there had been a few pounds more premium, that premium would have been nearly absorbed in charges, while the interest would have annually had to be remitted to England, instead of being circulated among ourselves.—For these and a variety of other reasons that could be adduced, we think the step now taken for meeting our Colonial liabilities is one in the right direction, and we hope to see it expanded more and more.

MUNICIPAL REFORM.—The Commissioners of the Municipality have refused to convene a public meeting, for the purpose of ascertaining whether or not it is the desire of the inhabitants to abolish the board of Wardmasters. The ground for this refusal is alleged to be that a couple of years ago, a resolution was adopted to abolish said board. If the inhabitants have altered their views, and now see reason not to make the proposed change, they must oppose the Commissioners by petition to Parliament.

TERRIBLE DISASTER IN TABLE BAY.—On Sunday last the schooner *Wasp* raised anchor to proceed on her voyage to East London. Baffled by headwinds she was still beating about the entrance of the bay on Monday morning. Towards noon the S.E. began to blow almost a hurricane, and the schooner made several fruitless efforts to return to the anchorage. About half-past 5 o'clock she was on a tack from the opposite side of the bay, almost in a line with the Breakwater, when she was suddenly turned over by a gust of wind and seen to disappear. The anchor boats of Messrs. Sorey, Dodde, and Morrison soon after proceeded from the North wharf to the spot where the schooner had been last seen, but returned without having discovered anything. The crew—consisting of Capt. Mauro, 5 men and a boy—had evidently gone down with the vessel. The *Wasp* was of 38 tons burthen, and owned by Messrs. Sorey & Co. Her cargo, consisting of general merchandise, shipped by Messrs. Dickson & Co., and oats shipped by Mr. Byrskes, was fully insured, but not so the vessel.

BURGHESDORP.—Last week Christian Johannes Hood was charged before the Resident Magistrate of Albert with murdering his servant Zwaartbooy. It appeared from the evidence that for some alleged neglect of duty on the part of deceased the prisoner had violently assaulted him, and in such a brutal manner that death ensued. There was much hard swearing, both on behalf of the Crown and of the prisoner, and the real facts of the case were not elicited until a whole host of witnesses had been examined. The papers have been forwarded to the Solicitor-General, but the general opinion is that the prisoner will be indicted for the lesser crime of manslaughter, the evidence scarcely warranting an indictment for murder.—*Ibid.*

FRAUD.—The magistrate is engaged this morning taking preliminary evidence in a charge of fraud preferred against Johannes G. van der Keamp, by Mr. Joseph Benjamin, of having in January, 1866, received in advance of £18 from him on a case purporting to contain ostrich feathers sent by the *Star of the East* to London, and which, when opened by the Custom House authorities and a sworn broker, was found to contain only a quantity of straw, rubbish, and three glass bottles full with putrid water. The case is remanded until Tuesday next.—*P. E. Telegraph.*

CAPTAIN R. V. DICKENS, 2nd battalion 11th Foot, has been appointed Deputy-Assistant Quarter-master-General at the Cape, in succession to Major A. S. Jones, V. C., of the 13th Light Infantry, who has completed his five years in the appointment.—*Ib.*

LOCUSTS.—A gentleman of this town, now on a country tour writes: "On Monday, 18th inst., on our way from Queenstown to Dorchester whilst about three hours from the former place—a heavy cloud came towards us, causing almost total darkness; on nearing we discovered it to be locusts, it was such a sight as you could not imagine. When they settled they covered about a hundred acres of ground one foot in depth. We drove through them with much difficulty."—*Ib.*

GREAT HAIL STORM AT THE WASCHBANK.—A tremendous hail storm, which lasted three quarters of an hour, broke over the Waschbank on Monday last. The hail-stones, we are informed, were in most cases as large as a good sized grape, and descended with great violence. The country in the neighbourhood of the Waschbank is looking well, and there is every prospect of a fine winter yield.—*Q. T. Representative.*

THE CIRCUIT COURT.—The cases for trial before the Circuit Court were rather numerous, no less than 53 prisoners being under indictment. The crimes of these people involved the summoning of no less than 124 witnesses, and the stock stolen was 15 head of cattle, 14 horses, and 156 sheep and goats. Of course this bears nothing like a comparison to the actual losses sustained by our agriculturists since the sitting of the last Circuit Court. The prisoners stood indicted as follows:—G. C. BAD NEWS.—We are informed that the Klauw and tongue sickness are still causing great ravages in our flocks. The most peculiar thing about the development of these diseases is that this is the second time during the season that they have appeared. Our farmers have been accustomed, to their sorrow, to single visitations during the season; but this is the first instance on record where cattle have been twice affected in the same season.—*Ib.*

THE WEATHER IN KAFFRERIA.—Since our last issue, says a Kaffrarian paper, copious rains have fallen in and around King William's Town. A light, drizzling rain fell during the greater part of Tuesday, which, towards four p.m., turned to heavy showers, and continued at intervals until after midnight, when the downpour increased, and continued without intermission throughout the night. We regret to hear, however, that scarcely any rain fell at Middle Drift, on the Beaufort line, on Tuesday, and that it did not extend as far as Sutton's Drift, on the Grahamstown road. In the East London district, we hear that the rain has fallen very heavily, and several of the rivers and streamlets have become swollen—the Noboon, on the Macloa road, being almost impassable yesterday morning. The Buffalo rose considerably during the night, and it is reported that a knee-battered horse, in attempting to cross on Wednesday was washed down and drowned. It is also reported that a German, from Keiskamma Hook, in attempting to cross with three horses, was washed down—horses drowned, himself narrowly escaping.—*Q. T. Free Press.*

INCEST.—Some time since we stated that an old and decrepit person named Petrus H. Terblans, residing at Baviana's Kraant, in the division of Fort Beaufort, had been apprehended on a charge of forming an improper intimacy with his daughter, a young girl aged 17 years. The prisoner was tried before the Eastern Districts Court, on the 11th inst., found guilty, and sentenced to two years imprisonment.—*E. P. Herald.*

DESPERATE ENCOUNTER WITH A SNAKE.—A few days ago Mr. Coldridge was passing the Whiteless road on horseback, when he observed a large black ringhals lying apparently asleep by the side of the road, and with the first instinct of a colonist, he revolved upon dispatching it. With a thick Sjabcock Mr. Coldridge struck at it repeatedly; and at length it assumed the defensive, and hissing with rage, charged several times at the gentleman. These attacks were dexterously avoided, although the snake got so close one time as to discharge a quantity of noxious saliva into the face of Mr. Coldridge. After a running fight of about a quarter of an hour, and when his fangs had been broken by a blow from the Sjabcock, it was at length despatched with a large stone. It was a snake of the largest size, and, as many of our readers are doubtless aware, of a very poisonous nature.—*Free Press.*

ORANGE FREE STATE.—By latest advices from the Free State, everything appears to be tending to outbreak of war between the Government of the Free State and the Basutos. The letter, notwithstanding they have been ordered off the recently conquered territory, still occupy it, and assume a most defiant air to any who make the least attempt to molest them. Farmers are afraid to occupy their purchased farms, and as a natural sequence the Government is bound to go to their assistance. Commandoes have been ordered to the front, and matters are beginning to assume a very warlike aspect. The *Friend* thus comments on the present state of affairs:—"The time allowed by the Government for the burgher force to assemble on the frontier has expired, and ere this a considerable body of our bravos, mounted and armed, are encamped in or near the territory. The question of peace or war still hangs trembling, as it were, in the balance, but one or two days must, we think, now settle the matter one way or the other. The Basutos may possibly evacuate the so-called conquered territory on the approach of our commando, and thus give us quiet possession without coming to blows, a consummation devoutly to be wished; but, in our opinion, one that is scarcely to be anticipated after the determined attitude assumed, or rather till talk indulged in by the old chieftain, when visited and expostulated with by his Lordship Bishop Twells, and still more recently by Mr. Richard Clark, as the bearer of the ultimatum of the Free State Government. Some expect a *truce* war, say of six weeks or three months' duration, others prophesy no war at all, but our own opinion leans the idea of those who foretell that the clearing of the conquered territory will and must lead to war, and in all probability to a long and harassing one.

"Everything is perfectly still from the Orange River along the whole line of frontier up to Harrismith. It is much to be feared that it is but the calm which presages the coming storm. Some say that Letsea (eldest son of Moshesh) will not fight, but remain neutral, with the hope of obtaining a grant of land from this State, the same as Molapo has done. Others say that Mollitani and his sons will refuse to take part with the Basutos, but will join the Free State force and tender their services on our side. We do not pretend to say on what foundation these reports rest, but shall be agreeably surprised should they, or either of them, turn out to be well-founded.

"Gandt, Kolbe with the Bloomfontein, and Comdt. Gideon Joubert with the Boschfontein contingents, have assembled at Rietfontein, near Coranaberg, where they will be joined by His Honor the President, who left this on Thursday, 14th inst., about 2 p.m., accompanied by the artillery, 4 guns under Capt. Goodman. The guns sent to the field on this occasion are the best ever turned out of Bloemfontein; all horse, but not fully manned. It is said His Honor

the President decided it was better to take men from the commando in the field to complete the complement rather than to hire men from here. The guns are 12 lb. howitzer, 16 lb. Whitworth breech-loader, 1 do. muzzle-loader, and 19 lb. Armstrong muzzle-loader, with shot, shell, time fuses, and every kind of ammunition for each gun of the newest and most approved description. The Jacobabad burghers, under Comdt. Van Niekerk, 43 in number, also passed through the town yesterday, and will escort the guns to the frontier. One muzzle-loading Whitworth 6-pounder has been sent off to Smithfield, and 1 8 lb. brass gun, the best we formerly had, to Bethlehem, for the use of Comdt. De Villiers' division, which left Harrismith, we understand, on the 3rd inst. Our whole army will thus be well supplied with artillery. We have heard but little of the movements of the burghers of other districts. The Foursmith and Philipolis contingents have not passed this way, but are doubtless by this time near the border. Prov. fieldcomr. G. Enslin, of Kafir River Ward, with about 40 burghers, was the first to proceed to the front.

"Prov. Fieldcomr. R. Clark, with 20 burghers belonging to this town, is expected to leave to-day. A few volunteers accompany him, but the beginning of last war is entirely wanting in this. But very few take up arms willingly, as they know that gross mismanagement and utter negligence on the part of the Government have been the main cause of our present difficulties. Some of those in our midst, who volunteered for the field last time, have to be forced out now, and a good deal of dissatisfaction is said to exist even among the Dutch Africanander farmers, through the Government having failed to comply with its most solemn promises and engagements made during the war of 1865-66.

Refreshing showers of rain had again fallen in the Free State; but heavier rains were needed to ensure good pasturage for the winter months. A Government notice is published in the *Friend*, warning farmers of the Eastern Province against being misled by Captain Waterboer; and his agent and representative at Colesberg, Mr. David Arnot. It turns out that a good portion of the land offered by Waterboer to the Albany farmers, on 2 1/2 years' leases, is actually situated on this side of the Vaal, and has belonged to the Orange Free State from the days of the British Svaaygruyt, at which period, titles or land certificates were granted to farms there situated.—*P. E. Telegraph.*

HIS HONOR PRESIDENT PRETORIUS who, according to the "Friend," has come of grief, has left Walkerstroom for New Scotland, accompanied by Mr. McCorkindale. To judge by the last reports received from Walkerstroom, His Honor is enjoying exceedingly good health and prospect in spite of the assertion of the "friend."—*Transvaal Argus.*

Our Paris Correspondent's Letter.
Paris, 8th Feb., 1867.
A NEW LIFE IN FRANCE.

Several of the Provincial papers in France, have an opinion of their own and publish leading articles on passing events just like their contemporaries in Paris. But by far the greater number receive observations sent ready prepared from the capital, so that on a certain day the very same article is seen to appear in every part of the Empire. This is effected by means of an agency of publicity existing at Paris, conducted by *l'Agence Bullier*, enjoying a considerable monopoly and on which the journals depend for telegraphic dispatches. It is that same agency which has undertaken to keep up a right way of thinking organs of opinion in the provinces. Naturally enough the decree of January 19, was the object of a lengthened comment in the lithographic sheet which the Havas agency sent out, but written in so strange a tone, that having been re-produced very generally in the country journals, it has now excited great indignation amongst some organs of the Paris Press. The writer evidently supposes that the effect of the decree was too lively; he is apprehensive that France might give way to foolish hopes in the sense of liberty; he desires to extinguish any bright flame that might have been lit up on the occasion, and he endeavours to reduce to the most paltry proportions the promises of the Imperial letter. What he seems above all to incalculable into his readers is the consolatory consideration that the Empire has not said its last word with respect to liberty, and that after the late decree, nothing whatever more is to be looked for.

The Parisian papers have as usual worn threadbare the subject of the intended reforms in the French Constitution.

THE ORIENTAL QUESTION.
In perusing the European journals one would suppose that war was on the point of breaking out. The European press swarms with incorrect statements, forgets the facts and false judgments. Because a portion of the Cretan population has risen in insurrection, the conclusion is jumped at that Turkey in Europe is threatened with a general conflagration. If the Greeks were more numerous, the bursting forth of this fire might alarm the Porte, but as they are in a minority, a rising in Thessaly and Epirus could only be disastrous to the populations of these two provinces. People seem to have forgotten that there are between the Black Sea and the Adriatic six millions of Bulgarians, irreconcilable enemies of the Greeks, and devoted subjects of the Ottoman Empire. Unless a foreign Power should declare war against the Sultan, Turkey has nothing to fear, and if an attack should be made from without the allies of the Porte would do what they have already done. A thousand fallacious rumours are again in circulation respecting the insurrection in Candia.

ROMES.
Our correspondent writes us, that a report was current in that city of the inclination of the Pontifical Government to effect reform, partly in conformity with the Emperor Napoleon's first known letter to General Edgar Ney. The first of these measures is said to be the reorganization of a civic guard, and the second, the formation of a secular militia. The same advices state that these reforms have been asked for from the Pope by the chief Roman aristocracy, headed by Prince Mark Anthony Borghese.

RETURN OF THE TROOPS FROM MEXICO.
We learn that preparations are rapidly being made for the transportation of the French troops now in Mexico across the Atlantic, and there is every reason to believe that any cause of difference which might exist between the Government of the Tuilleries and that of the White House will soon have ceased to exist. We hear that the Mexicans regard the departure of the French with the same apathy as they saw them arrive.

ent endeavouring to hold his own against some turbulent faction. The Austrian Prince is certainly in no worse position than many of his predecessors, but in his own interest, and more especially in that of Mexico we wish him greater success.

VOLTAIRE.
The proposition to organize a subscription for the purpose of raising a statue to Voltaire has given rise to a very sharp discussion in the Paris press, some of the journals opposing the proposed measure in the strongest terms. The *Pays*, an organ of the Bonaparte dynasty, in a long article says, that Voltaire was a defamer of the popular classes, speaking of them with the greatest contempt. As a citizen he ridiculed all the ministers who succeeded each other under Louis XV., and likewise all the King's mistresses. He in fact laid his lance in the breach at the feet of Fleury, Bernis, Richelieu, Mamepeau, Choiseul, and Turgot. He adulterated the pure and virtuous Queen Marie Leszczinska, and almost in the same breath Madame de Pompadour and afterwards the Dubarry. It is true that among his intimate acquaintances, he made up for the violence of his adulations by the abusive bitterness of his mockery. A certain school of Catholics has been reproached with their doctrine of mental reservation, but what can be said of Voltaire? In these years, 1759, 60 and 61, he was in correspondence with King Stanislaus who had loaded him with favours, and at whose court he had long resided. King Stanislaus, wrote he, to Marmontel, he sent me a letter of the kindest description &c. The King, he said to Theopoc, has sent me his book, I enclose you a sonnet, Sen, if it is not favorable. And nearly at the same time, says commencing with Theopoc he treated King Stanislaus as a fool, getting up silly books by the aid of his secretary an ex-Jesuit. As a patriot, he was still worse. France was engaged in the unfortunate seven years war. At that time so full of humiliation and disasters for France, what was the game of Voltaire? This one. He inflamed Choiseul against the King of Prussia, and he wrote a satire against the minister, and the very first thing Voltaire did, was to show it to the latter. On the other side, he wrote to the King that he had never breathed a word concerning the matter to any one, whilst at the same time he advised Choiseul not to treat with the King. To the latter he wrote: "Your verses are charming, and if you Majesty has been your enemy, they become still better." We must not forget that the *ennemie*, alluded to are the French, those unfortunate victims of the ignorance of Court Generals named by the favour of the King's mistresses, heads of the army and Marshals of France.

It is really necessary to draw money from one's purse to glorify such reminiscences! The majority of the Parisian papers are of opinion that it is not necessary to honour such a person by a sort of national manifestation; they say he was carried to the Pantheon, that surely is enough, if not too much.

THE IMPERIAL LIBRARY.
The Imperial Library in Paris has just received several important donations from various hands. The Emperor has presented it with the original Manuscript of Humboldt's "Cosmos." The Emperor has sent a Hebrew old Testament written on vellum, as stated some time ago, from which he has received the original Manuscript of the language of Thibet, a sanacrit manuscript in the Daranagur characters and valuable papers, once the property of Monsieur Ariel, French agent in the East Indies. Dr. Clot Bey has sent 18 manuscripts in Arabic and Turkish, and 25 others in Arabic alone.

SEA'S FURIE IN PARIS.
Last year horseflesh was very much the fashion in the French capital, but that seems to have made way for Beef's flesh, which is now much in favour; it is said to be sold at the rate of 3d per pound; it is said to be much relished by the lower classes.

THE PARIS EXHIBITION.—Less than two months, says the Paris correspondent of the *Globe*, now separate us from the date fixed for the opening of the Exhibition, and the progress of the works does not appear, at least to an eye unaccustomed to building mysteries, to be sufficiently rapid to promise completion by the date. The iron structure is not yet painted throughout the inside, and not painted at all on the outside; the flooring in many parts is not down; the central garden, and that which runs round the edifice, are still in a state of chaos. The French, it is true, in their department have begun building their stalls, but the English have marked out on the floor the sites to be occupied by them; Russians, Swiss, and even Spaniards, are also at work; but in the rest of the vast expanse scarcely anything has been done. It was said a fortnight ago or more, in some newspapers, that the goods had begun to pour in; on Saturday there were about a score of boxes from England, and next day still the most advanced portion of the merchandise is only a copy of the French, whilst the English have got ostensibly indicated a place for the vending of pale ale. How characteristic of the two people it is, that one should, before all things, provide a cafe, and the other think about beer! The outside of the Exhibition seems likely to be more interesting than the interior. There the Russian have built a model of one of their wooden houses, and very pretty it is. The Swedes also are constructing a house in wood; and that wise man, the Viceroi of Egypt, has spent thousands of pounds (£72,000, it is said) in erecting, on a large scale, specimens of Egyptian edifices. All this is curious enough; but what is the most advanced portion of the work? The non-trading part of the Fairman's continues to manifest the most profound indifference to the show.
