THE EASTERN ELECTION.

The battle in the Eastern Province has been fought and resulted in the crushing defeat of the Responsible, notwithstanding the many advantages they had. Their candidate went to battle under conditions so favourable, as they may hardly hope to see reproduced in future contests. They had a candidate whose personal popularity was as great as his private and political character was unimpeachable...

We now have the greater portion of the electoral returns before us, and these, briefly stated, come to this that for every single vote given to the Liberal Fleming the Conservative Christian got two and something more. Christian's total is more than double that of Fleming. And the most remarkable feature of the result is that the Conservative majority is not simply made up by votes of ultra-Eastern places like Graham's Town. Even if all the Frontier votes had been deducted from both sides...

This shows that the Eastern opposition to Responsible Government is not centred in a clique or single locality, but is general, extends itself over the whole province. It moreover proves that several Eastern members of the Assembly, though sincere in their motives and convictions may be, in their advocacy of Responsible Government do not represent the views of their constituents. And in the face of this result we think it would be utterly unwise for the Parliament—not to use a stronger word—to precipitate Responsible Government upon the country. It would be par excellence a Western measure, be treated by the Easterns as such, and not have that fair chance of a successful working which we wish it to have whenever it is tried in the colony.

But we are told that the result of the election really cannot be accepted as an expression of opinion on the fitness of Responsible Government for the colony, so much as an indication of territorial jealousy or Eastern distrust of the West. We regret to think that there is some truth in this. The opposition against Fleming was not based on hatred of Responsible Government pure et simple. The Port Elizabeth merchants did not support Christian with the same sort of feeling which some Western Conservatives would have done...

But that very fact proves how utterly unfit the colony is for Responsible Government. It may be that in each of the Provinces separately Government by party will work passably well; but so long as that state of feeling continues, of which we accept the result of the late election as an indication, we cannot imagine how a Responsible ministry will be able to satisfy both East and West.

It is said to be one of the virtues of Responsible Government that it must necessarily be fair to the Easterns and ally their opposition, or else it will not stand for a moment. We acknowledge that a Government which is not fair to both parties, will not be able to maintain itself. But we hold that more than that is required. It is not only necessary that it should be fair, but that its fairness should be admitted by both sides. Has the present Parliament not been fair to the East? If it has not, then the Eastern suspicion and distrust of the West is fully justified. But, in common with Mr. Solomon, Mr. Molteno and other Responsible leaders, we hold that it has been fair and even more than that. But is the fact acknowledged? Let the result of the recent contest testify to that. What reason have we to believe that Western justice will be more highly esteemed under Government by party, than it is at present? Or is the ministry to conciliate opposition—by being more generous than the West has hitherto been to the East, even by removing the seat of government to the East? We hardly know a dozen Westerners who would not rather consent to separation than such a measure. And yet, with the Diamond Fields and Basutoland annexed, we cannot conceive of a ministry setting its face against that request, and at the same time effectively governing the country.

Latest Telegrams. PORT ELIZABETH.

Bark South Easter arrived from London this morning. Placed in quarantine, two cases of small pox having broken out during voyage. Both cases declared convalescent. Very large sale of diamonds to be held in Town Hall this afternoon. Wool market continues dull.

Arrived 4th, Tamar, from Mauritius with 140 men 32nd Regt. who were landed shortly after the arrival of the steamer, part of the 2nd, 20th, embarked yesterday, the remainder go on board to day. The Minnie sailed out of the River this morning at 9 a.m., for the Knysna. Heavy thunder storm accompanied with rain yesterday morning; to-day wind strong from the West.

KING WILLIAM'S TOWN. Diamond News, 25th, Friend, 30th November. Death of Father Hidin confirmed. The mortality at the fields is becoming alarming and many are leaving for healthier localities. Death of James Thorne, diamond cutter, confirmed. Friend's correspondent at Dutoitspan, writing 25th Nov., says intelligence has just reached this place of the finding of a 400-carat diamond at the New Rush. Accidents at New Rush of daily occurrence—during week several animals fell into claims and were killed.

Messrs. S. Brown and Wolterang from British Kaffria turned out a (splendid though slightly off-coloured) stone of 83 carats, and another on the same day of 32 carats. Gold.—The Transvaal Advocate is responsible for the following bit:—A Mr. Venter has found near Marabas Stad a nugget of the size of a bullet of 25 to the lb.—he dug it out with an oxhorn.—The following is an extract from a private letter: "I heard at Du Toit's Pan on Friday last from a trustworthy and reliable authority, but I am not at liberty to mention his name, as Mr. Webb does not wish it to be made public until all things are settled, that gold has been found at Bultfontein by Mr. Webb. I cannot say whether it is in payable quantities or not—it was found very deep. I saw 18 funerals in one day at Du Toit's Pan and the New Rush."
