THE CHERNIAVSKIS.

SUNDRY ITEMS.

Cape Town,

2nd June, 1918.

My dear Cousin.

This has been Baby Week and the town has been full of it. It started amid rain on Monday last-a long and varied programme. There were talks to girls, and talks to mothers, and talks to fathers. There were baby shows; demonstrations of cooking, nursing, and washing; lectures, socials, entertainments, exhibitions, and finally a procession which was one of the most interesting items of an interesting array of events. The Child Welfare Exhibition which was held in the City Hall attracted a large number of people and it is to be hoped that the various exhibits and posters displayed there will arouse thought and educate where most needed. I noticed Mrs Stern in charge of one of the exhibits and Mrs. Katzin, the Hon. Treasurer, at the opening ceremony. At the Government House Meeting Mrs. Saphra seemed to be the only representative of Jewish women, and there the Rev. A. P. Bender, in a witty speech, proposed the vote of thanks to the Mayor who presided. Another function that appealed greatly was an afternoon meeting at the International Hotel where Miss Marriott and Professor Clarke expounded the Montessori system of education. Mrs. Stern was one of the organisers of this meeting and the hall was filled to overflowing with a most interested audience. The procession it-elf was charming. There were decorated cars showing the value of children—the asset that is greater than gold—there were the Girl Guides and Boy Scouts, a Pied Piper of Hamelin with a retinue of children in quaint 14th century costume and numerous symbolic banners and tableaux arranged on motor or horse lorries. The week finished to-day with special services in the various Houses of Worship. La bis hooismi Sérecé Symagogue the service was held yesterday afternoon,

The Rev. W. Wilder officiating and Mr. Adv. M. Alexander M.L.A. delivering an excellent address. The offertory of the morning service was devoted to the Child Life Protection Society. In the Gardens Synagogue the special choral service was held this morning. Rev. Strod officiated and the Rev. A. P. Bender read the special prayers and delivered an appropriate and eloquent address. The Synagogue was crowded, the large number of children present being particularly noticeable. There was a collection in aid of the Child Life Protection Society, the Jewish Girl Guides and Boy Scouts taking charge of same.

Yesterday afternoon the children's service in the Gardens Synagogue was more than usually interesting. It was the 1st Saturday in the month and on this day the Hope Mill School Scouts and the Jewish Troop of Girl Guides always attend the service, special hymns being sung.

Leo Cherniavsky, the violinist, gave a magnificent rendering of Ernst's Concerto in F sharp major for which his brother Alex acted as accompanist.
