

Ada Reeve.

There is only one Ada Reeve though there have been plenty who have put up similar public performances. There is a magnetism about the artiste herself which has never been approached by any other artiste that ever visited this country, and this is the secret of her success. One feels that Ada Reeve is personally interested in everyone to whom she sings and no one could more skilfully interpret the songs she selects. At the same time there a sort of drawing room atmosphere of homely ease and geniality which she so cleverly conceals and there is no feeling of studied effect. Quite a lot of people are un der a misapprehension as to Miss Ada Reeve's age which must be due to the fact that she has for so many years occupied a foremost position on the stage. It would be ungallant to give away the exact year in which she first saw the footlights, but our readers can rest assured that Miss Reeve was of a very tender age when the Zulu War broke out here. Her first appearance on the stage was to play the part of 'Little Willie' in the famous drama "East Lynne" at the age of six years and from that time she has always figured in the principal London theatres and has remained both in London and elsewhere one of the heads of the profession ever since.

His Majestys.

On Saturday evening the final performance of the present season of Marie Tempest will take place and on Monday the American Dramatic Company, which has become so deservedly popular here, will re-enter into possession. Their premiere will see the production of "The Silent Witness" described as a melo-drama with a prologue and three acts. The play is said to be distinctly sensational and particularly dramatic and with the excellent interpretation that this well-balanced Company may be expected to give it, should be entirely successful.

The Empire.

On Monday next at the holiday matinee Laura Geurite will make a welcome return. The occasion will be the first production of "The Bing Boys are here" which is declared by some to be London's most successful revue and which certainly had a run of three years at the Alhambra Theatre The cast includes George Ross in the "Robe" part and Basil Scott in the "Lester" part and if rumour is not incorrect there

is likely to be more than ordinary excitement the first night.
