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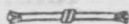
SCOTCH EGGS.

Cut in halves lengthwise, and serve each half on a round of fried bread, accompanied with thick brown gravy.

The Capetown Orchestra.

A Brilliant Opening

It is indeed pleasing to find that a much greater interest is being taken in the Capetown Orchestra, who are giving a series of performances in Johannesburg and along the Reef. It is to be hoped that the present season will be a success from the financial point of view, certainly the programmes submitted are of the finest and all that now remains is for Johannesburg to show its practical appreciation of the artistic merits of Mr. Theo Wendt and his body of talented players.

On Friday, March 30th, the orchestra joined forces with the Johannesburg Philharmonic Society in what was a memorable performance of 'Judas Macabaeus'; on Saturday it took part in the production of a ballet at the Palladium and the first production of Mr. Wendt's musical comedy; on Sunday night it rendered a splendid programme of popular music at the Town Hall, and on Tuesday in the same place, it gave the first symphony programme. Mr. Wendt directed a performance of the overture to the "Mastersingers," Strauss's "Death and Transfiguration" and the sixth symphony of Glazounow. All of them were well received. The "Shechita" Problem.

During the last fourteen or fifteen days a correspondence has been proceeding in the Johannesburg *Star* on the pros and cons of *Shechita*. Looking at the matter from an unbiassed point of view, the "antis" have not made out any case at all. The Rev. J. L. Landau's letters, to my mind, were such that they disposed of any doubts as to the value of the Jewish method of slaughter from a humane point of view, in short the anti-*shechita* party are floundering all over the place. Instead of facing the issue, they coolly tell us that they intend to do their utmost to get the Government to take action and Jewry need have no fears that its representatives will do their utmost to controvert the misguided tactics of the so called "humanitarians". Certainly, a good lead has been given by Dr. J. L. Landau's timely action.

The Johannesburg Library.

I cannot congratulate the critics of the committee of the Johannesburg Library upon their tactics for, not only are they distinctly unconstitutional, but some of them are anti-semitic. Certain critics are hinting that the members of the Jewish Guild are being asked to attend the adjourned meeting of members with a view to keeping the present committee in office. This is entirely wrong. There are, I believe, some four thousand subscribers to the Library and, the Guild percentage of this number is not more than twelve per cent, so this can have little effect on any voting that may take place. Again, the Guild Executive do not control the

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actions of the individual members who can please themselves as to how they vote and, it may also be added, that there are other ways of bringing about a change than that of endeavouring to create anti-semitism by making suggestions that Jewish members are using their votes blindly.

Witwatersrand Agricultural Show.

All records were broken at this year's show and the committee are to be congratulated upon the achievement. Mr. J. G. Torrance, the energetic Secretary is deserving of great praise for the efficient manner in which he organised the whole series of events. There were large attendances each day and Jewry too, were liberal in their patronage of so popular and educational an affair.

The Eisteddfod.

As usual Jewish competitors were well to the fore in the Eisteddfod competitions held in Johannesburg last week end. In fact, to all intents and purposes, they "swept the boards" in practically every class they entered for. Whilst I do not altogether agree with these competitions I cannot but admit that it is pleasing to see Jewish children taking so great a part in this as well as other spheres of activity. But why not a Jewish competition only? This should prove very interesting.

The S. A. Championships

There was only one Jewish competitor in the South African Athletic Championships held at the Wanderers' last week. He entered for was the three miles walking championship and, Mr. B. Rogoff the competitor in question, finished second. He has a good, as well as a classical action and favourably impressed the judges. He is only a comparative newcomer as far as championships are concerned but, should in the future achieve the highest honours if he continues as he is.
