His Majesty's

"Whirled Into Happiness" is undoubtedly one of the liveliest and breeziest musical farces which have been placed on the stage, and presented by the new 1923 Musical Comedy Co., it becomes a sheer pleasure and delight to witness its performance. But the success of a production such as this, depends to the greatest extent upon the capability of the chief comedian, and it is my pleasant duty to testify that in this respect Victor Crawford satisfies to the fullest degree all the demands which his role makes. Small of stature though he is, he acts, sings and dances with a remarkable ability, and the unqualified success of the farce is undoubtedly greatly to be attributed to him. He reaped the well deserved approval of the audience, whom he kept in incessant roars of laughter, by unstinted rourds of applause. In this respect he found in Rowland Sherry a worthy second. Gordon Sherry is the hero of the piece. He has a fine stage appearance and sings and acts well. As for the ladies, the palm must be handed to Vera Pearce, who makes a dashing and withal graceful and charming Delphine, the French danseuse. She has a pretty voice and she dances gracefully and acts convincingly. Her French pronunciation of the English is remarkably well done, the more as she is English born. Ethel Cadman makes a sweet Florence, who uses her pretty voice to great advantage. All the other parts, of more or less minor importance are well sustained, and their representatives contribute their full quota to the success of the production. But special mention must be made of Joan Winterbourne, a wee kiddie of hardly over 3½ years, who performs a pretty little dance in the second act. Great credit reflects on the producer, Mr. F. Maxwell Stewart. The music, in part, is pretty and appealing in its melodiousness. There is no doubt that "Whirled Into Happiness" will enjoy a long and successful run.

Laymen Officiate as Vienna Rabbis Strike.

The executive board of the Jewish community of Vienna has announced that the strike of Jewish rabbis, cantors and grave diggers will not be allowed to interfere with marriages, burials and other religious ceremonies. The members of the Board, it was announced, will step in and perform the duties of the Jewish religious workers during the strike.

The strike was called by the religious workers on March 20. They are demanding a 30 per cent increase in their salaries contending that they are unable to live on their present salaries. Chief Rabbi Chajes of Vienna is absent from the city. An attempt at reaching a settlement is being made.
