ADOLPH HALLIS'S SUCCESSES.

A GRAND BALL.

GENERAL NEWS.

(SPECIAL TO THE "S.A. JEWISH CHRONICLE")

Adolph Hallis received a most cordial recognition by the audience last Thursday night at the Symphony Concert where he played in concerto with the Orchestra the famous work of Tchaikovsky in B flat minor. The audience was exceptionally good and the brilliant pianist was recalled again and again by enthusiastic applause. W.J.M., writing of the concert in the "Cape Argus" says: "Mr. Adolph Hallis played last night better than I have ever heard him play before. There is a wonderful clarity in his playing which his vigorous interpretation does not overshadow. But he gave Tchaikovsky last night in the right spirit, with a fine masculine vigour that made the concerto seem an affair of tempered genius."

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Under the auspices of the Paarl Music Association a most successful piano and vocal recital was given at the Paarl on Wednesday evening last by Mr. Adolph Hallis and Mr. Hubert Curling.

The concert was well attended, and both artists were very favourably received. Chopin's Valse Brillante, No. 1, and Liszt's Second Rhapsody, brilliantly rendered by Mr. Hallis, roused particular enthusiasm. There were three vocal and three instrumental groups.

Hallis played the Mozart Fantasia in C minor, Beethoven's 32 Variations, a modern group, and the Chopin and Liszt pieces mentioned above.

He is playing by request again at Paarl on his return to the Cape prior to leaving for England.

Mr. Hallis has left for Johannesburg where he will play at several private "At Homes," as he did in Cape Town.

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On Wednesday night the annual ball under the auspices of the Cape Jewish Board of Guardians (incorporating the Jewish Ladies' Association and the Cape Town Jewish Philanthropic Society) was held. There was a large assembly at the City

Hall to support the organisers in their endeavour to raise funds for the poor and needy among the local Jewish community.

Mrs. H. Stodel (hon. organiser) and a band of enthusiastic workers combined to make the affair both a financial and gratulated upon the excellent arrangements made for the comfort and enjoyment of the patrons.

The hall was artistically transformed with garlands of flowers and evergreens, the bays and the stage being festooned with foliage, and gay streamers.

There was an exhibition of dancing—ballroom and stage—by Mr. Harold G. Hastings and Miss Ethel Benson (of the Adelphi School of Dancing), who were enthusiastically applauded.

The principal officers of the Society were present with their wives and amongst others many distinguished guests, whilst the beautiful dresses worn by the ladies, were so numerous and interesting that only the exigencies of space prevent their mention. Indeed nearly a column of the morning paper was occupied with the tale of the georgette and charmeuse and crepe de chine in all the colours of the rainbow that adorned the ladies at the dances.

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The Local Zionist Committees have made arrangements for displaying a cinema film at the City Hall next week showing modern Palestine.

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A fancy dress dance is being arranged for October 10th at the Railway Institute by the Jewish Literary and Dramatic Society for the raising of funds to increase its library.

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The sixth of the series of Bridge Drives organised by the Save the Jewish Children Fund took place in the Rawene Tearooms. Provisions was made for non-Bridge players in the shape of a Rummy Drive.

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Mr. and Mrs. Moscovitch spent their last evening in Cape Town

with the children of the Cape Jewish Orphanage.

Mr. Ochberg, on behalf of the Committee, extended a hearty welcome to the visitors. In replying, Mr. Moscovitch declared that 44 years ago he witnessed a pogrom in his native town of Odessa, an experience he would never forget.

Some of the children he saw before him, who came from the Ukraine, had gone through similar experiences which it was hardly likely that they would forget. He felt sure, however, that, having been adopted by so generous a community as the Jews of Cape Town, the children gradually would get away from their early experiences and would develop into splendid types of citizens.

South Africa was indeed a glorious country, and while these children had been unfortunate, they were also extremely fortunate in having been rescued and being now looked after in so splendid a manner.
