We have had the pleasure of seeing Mr. Maurice Moscovitch as Jean Pauret in "The Great Lover", Shylock in "The Merchant of Venice", and now as Anton Ragatzy in "The Outsider" and his interpretations of the various parts have held one spell bound. The present play now drawing large houses at His Majesty's Theatre is, if anything, a wonderful appeal for the consideration of the claims of those who have the power to heal and yet are not members of the medical profession.
