More especially, when one sees how efficiently work has been carried out.

The delegates on Sunday next have to arrive at some important decisions and, we trust that they will, as in the past, give careful attention to matters. We hope that the discussions will be carried out in a cool, collected manner and whatever result is arrived at will be faithfully followed by South African Jewry.

Too Mild.

"I was too mild an Anti-Semite," declared Adolf Hitler, defeated leader of the Bavarian Beer Revolution, now imprisoned in Lapsberg, when he commented upon the information submitted to him of the reports circulated in the Jewish press that he had renounced Anti-Semitism. "It is ridiculous," he stated. "To the contrary, I was rather too mild an Anti-Semite. I am now engaged in writing a book which I consider to be the work of my life in which I will prove that only through a sharp campaign against the Jews will the world be saved from the Jewish disease."

An Unfair Law.

If one wants to get some idea of just how drastic the present immigration restriction law of the U.S.A. is, it is only necessary to know that in the first two months under the new law only seven thousand immigrants were admitted as against 119,000 in the same period last year. In the meantime the ports of Europe are crowded with suffering Jews who disposed of their home-effects ready to embark to the New World. Of course now they cannot go.

The Conference Report.

In reading through the report of the United South African Jewish Relief Reconstruction and Orphans Fund one cannot help being amazed at the vast amount of work done with so small an amount of money compared with the previous years. This does not in any way imply that in the years gone by when larger sums of money have been donated that the money has been wrongly spent on the contrary, it

proves conclusively that the Executive have shown remarkable economy in the matter of administration. The Palestine Orphans' Scheme is developing satisfactorily and now that relief is no longer necessary to such a great extent as in former years one sees that quite a considerable amount has been devoted to the cause of reconstruction. A pleasing feature of the proceedings is the invitation of the Orphanage Committee for the delegates to visit Arcadia and we think that it will in all probability result in many further workers being obtained on behalf of so great a cause.

The South African Jewish Orphanage.

I was present not only at the first performance but also the second given by the orphans at the Standard Theatre and on each occasion there was a packed house. Personally, I think that the children deserved to have this because their acting was splendid and all of them did their best. To those who were opposed to the children giving such a performance and being kept up late I cannot do better than commend them to take to heart Mr. M. I. Isaacson's speech. He pointed out that the Orphanage was in need of money and that when the Russian orphans were brought to this country Jewry flocked to see them and promised assistance but now they seem to be forgotten. I hope that the Orphanage will receive much more practical support in the future and then such entertainments will perhaps not be necessary.
