

A POT-POURRI OF HAPPENINGS.

(From Our Own Correspondent.)

There has been little of importance happening in the local community of late, and this is no doubt due to organisers of social movements taking a rest during the "hot season." Social activities are now commencing and as soon as the Circle emerges from recessional inactivity, the buzz of the busy bees will be heard.

On the evening of the 24th January the local Zionist Society held a Memorial Meeting at the S.A.R. & H. Hall (by courtesy of the Circle Executive), for the purpose of paying a tribute to the memory of Achad Haam as well as to the late Dr. Max Nordau, whose "Yahrzeit" it was. Cantor M. Menachemson recited the Hazkarah. The chairman was Mr. N. Stone, whilst Rev. E. M. Levy, M.A., and Mr. Y. Blumenthal delivered addresses. The former spoke interestingly of the great part played by Achad Haam in modern Jewish history, and Mr. Blumenthal spoke of Dr. Nordau. A very interesting function concluded with the singing of Hatikvah and the National Anthem.

The installation of the new officers of the F. C. Hollander Lodge, Hebrew Order of David, took place on the 31st January. The Grand President of the Order, Wor. Bro. Dr. C. Spiro, came specially to Durban to officiate and his visit caused considerable enthusiasm. The local press gave prominent cognisance to Dr. Spiro's presence, for he is a popular figure in the movement in Johannesburg and also referred in eulogistic terms to the excellent work put in by the retiring President, Bro. L. M. Braham, who is succeeded by Mr. H. Moss Morris. The following were installed into office: President, H. Moss Morris; Vice-President, M. Moss; Treasurer, I. Ware; Hon. Secretary, A. J. Lipinski; M.C., A. Ware; Inside Guardian, A. Foote; Trustees, J. Byala, S. Eagle and M. Stone; Book Examiners, P. Eagle and I. Geshen; Committee, L. M. Braham, B. Levy, A. Magnus, B. Berman, L. T. In installing Brother President, the Grand President said, that bearing in mind the numerous services of Bro. Morris to all Jewish movements, he felt assured that the destiny of the Lodge would be in safe keeping. In reply, the Bro.
