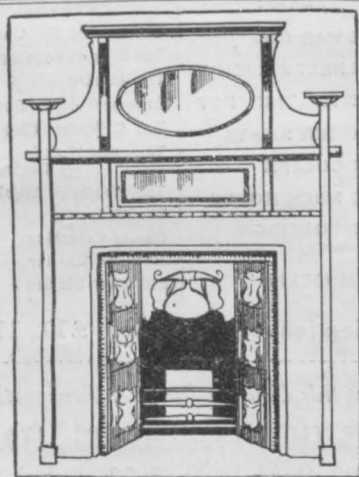

*Phone 208 May.**Cape Jewish Orphanage.****ANNUAL PRIZE DISTRIBUTION.**

A very interesting function and one which is always keenly anticipated by the inmates of the Institution, took place on Sunday. It was the annual distribution of prizes to the orphan children for Hebrew and Secular Education. A very large gathering of friends of the Home participated in the event. Unfortunately many were prevented from being present for various reasons and one regretted the absence of the Rev. A. P. Bender, Rabbi Ch. Mirvish, as well as the President, Councillor L. Gradner. During the year the children indulge in friendly rivalry for possession of beautiful prizes which are donated by friends of the Institution. On Sunday, Mr. Gesundheit, Chairman of the Education Sub-Committee, occupied the chair, and in his opening address gave a comprehensive report of the activities of his Sub-Committee and details of the progress made by the children in Hebrew and secular education. He paid a handsome tribute to the qualities of the Hebrew teacher, Mrs. Gordon, and acknowledged the services rendered by Mr. Simenhoff, Miss Frank, Miss Apirion (music teachers) and Miss Hamburg (elocution). After a piano solo by Mr. Harry Jacobson, Mr. Isaac Ochberg said he was happy to be present at the function and he was particularly gratified to find how happy and well the children were. Two of the boys who were Barmitzvah he had brought from Russia, and he was particularly pleased to be present at the reception given to them. When he brought them from Eastern Europe they were very small boys, but now they were grown up, they had reached that age when they were admitted as full grown members of Jewry. It was, Mr. Ochberg continued, a great responsibility when a boy reached the age of thirteen; he sincerely hoped that each one of the three would strive their utmost to honour their own name and the name of Jew, at the same time he had no doubt that they would discharge their duties as men and would ultimately become a credit not only to the Orphanage which brought them up, not only to Jewry to which they belong, but also to the general community of the country in which they lived. Proceeding, Mr. Ochberg said that he felt that there should not be one co-religionist in Cape Town, who should keep away from such a function as that at which they were present that afternoon. There could be no greater pleasure to any one than to see the children of the Home look so happy and content, and although there was a large attendance that day, he hoped that in the future there would still be larger gatherings. In conclusion, Mr. Ochberg made an appeal for funds for the Library and congratulated the children who had distinguished themselves by winning prizes that day.

Songs and dances were given by Miss Edie Richmond and Miss Pearl Lazarus, following which the prizes were distributed by Mrs. Fryde. At this stage there was great enthusiasm amongst the youngsters, and as each boy or girl advanced to the table to receive his or her gift they were greeted with an ovation. It was indeed a great occasion for the little ones.

Mr. Herbstein, in moving a vote of thanks to Mr. and Mrs. Fryde, mentioned that it was five years since he relinquished his duties as a member of the Education Sub-Committee, although he had since undertaken Executive work for the Institution as Hon. Treasurer. He appreciated, as did the whole Committee, the kindly interest in the Institution evinced by their friends Mr. and Mrs. Fryde.

Mr. Herbstein paid a tribute to the work done by the late Rev. J. M. East, on behalf of the children's education, which had been faithfully continued by Mr. Crasnow and their present Chairman, Mr. S. Gesundheit. Each in turn had shown a heart-whole interest in the Home and the children. To Mr. and Mrs. Fryde they were particularly grateful for all they had done. They had the welfare of the Institution at heart and nothing was too much for them to do for the little ones. Mr. Herbstein then called for cheers for Mr. and Mrs. Fryde, which were given in typical orphanage style. The proceedings terminated with Hatikvah and God Save the King.

**South African Jewish
Board of Deputies.***(Published by request.)*

A meeting of the South African Jewish Board of Deputies was held at the Jewish Guild Building, on Sunday. Mr. Raphaely, Acting President, was in the Chair.

The following resolution, to be forwarded to the Prime Minister, was unanimously passed:—

"That this meeting of the South African Jewish Board of Deputies on behalf of South African Jewry protests against the anti-Semitic outrages being perpetrated in Roumania and the attitude of the Roumanian Government in doing nothing to protect the lives and property of Jews in that country or to punish the instigators of these anti-Jewish excesses, and respectfully urges the Union Government to make representations to the League of Nations in this matter, with a view to bringing pressure to bear upon the Roumanian Government to take such steps as will effectively put a stop to such excesses."

It was decided to cable to the relatives of the late Achad Ha'am (Asher Ginsburg), the renowned Hebrew scholar and writer, the condolence of the Board of Deputies, as representing the Jewish people in South Africa, in the great loss sustained by his lamented death.

Another resolution unanimously passed was one expressing the Board's appreciation of Advocate Morris Alexander, K.C., M.L.A., bringing about an amendment of the Naturalisation Act of 1926, making it possible for all Justices of the Peace to sign the Certificate of Repute in connection with application for Naturalisation, and of the assistance rendered in this connection by Messrs. B. S. Hersch, M. Kentridge, M.L.A., and Emile Nathan, M.L.A., the latter of whom seconded the amending Bill in the Legislative Assembly.

The appointment of a special committee and the action taken by it in assisting the Witwatersrand Juvenile Affairs Board in obtaining billets for Jewish youths were reported.

It was also reported that representations were being made to the authorities regarding the alleged discrimination being made against Jews in connection with the admission of pupils to certain of the Government schools and in the appointment of teachers to permanent posts in the Transvaal.
