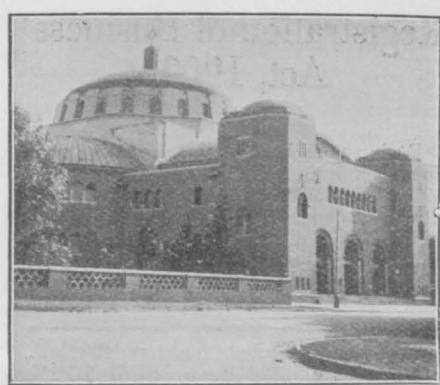




JOHANNESBURG DAY BY DAY



ASSOCIATION OF JEWISH MINISTERS.

The Association of Jewish Ministers recently formed in Johannesburg has issued a circular letter to all such ministers in the Transvaal and Orange Free State, inviting them to a conference at a time that will coincide with the Congress of the South African Jewish Board of Deputies.

According to present arrangements these bodies will meet on or about 30th July.

The Jewish ministers will discuss:

- (1) The position of Jewish ministers in this country.
- (2) Various aspects of Jewish life in South African communities.
- (2) Formation of a permanent Minister's Association to further interests of Jewish ministers in South Africa and those of their respective congregations.

TALMUD TORAH CAMPAIGN.

The Council of the United Talmud Torah has launched a strenuous campaign for funds. At a recent meeting it was agreed that all who participate in the campaign and collection shall come to the next meeting of the Finance Committee and report progress.

The amounts collected at functions will in future be paid to the United Talmud Torahs, and the money will be distributed according to their needs, till the Union takes over the entire management of the schools on 1st September of the current year. The Finance Committee will function from the 1st October.

Already some handsome donations have been received, including several gifts of £100 and £50.

ANNA CLIVE'S SUCCESS.

There is always something thrilling about a sudden success, and when it takes the form of fame found in a whole world is sympathetic. This wonderful experience has fallen to the lot of Anna Clive who was popular with Johannesburg audiences when she played with the local Amateur Operatic Society, or sang on the concert platform; yet when she decided to try her fortune in England and accepted the offer of a tour with Ronald Frankau's party, The Cabaret Kittens, there were few to help her on her way. Miss Aimee Parkeson, the well-known teacher of singing, had befriended the young Jewish girl, and after training her voice and putting her in the way of engagements expected the Jewish Guild to help her in giving Anna a good send-off. But the Guild of those days, or rather those who controlled it, were unsympathetic, and Miss Parkeson wrote to the papers complaining of its attitude and hinting that in her opinion a Jewish artist could expect little, if any, support from the Jewish public at the outset of a career. It may be re-

membered that others, including Moscovitch have said the same. He maintained that his own people were loud in their laudation after his talent had been recognised and encouraged by others, but very tardy with their appreciation before the successful stage had been reached. Be that as it may, Anna Clive was able to reach London, and because she was patient and hard-working as well as talented she was ready for the opportunity when it came. She must have made great strides in her art since leaving South Africa, for although she made an excellent impression in Gilbert and Sullivan opera, and was very pleasing as Yum-Yum and Elsie Maynard, she never roused an audience to such enthusiasm as she created when she stepped into Winnie Melville's part in "The Vagabond King." The papers tell us that the unknown understudy caused a veritable furore, members of the audience standing upon chairs to acclaim her and the orchestra joining in the applause. No such triumph befell her here, yet her dainty figure, graceful movements, and really charming soprano voice were always admired and applauded. The environment of the London stage offers many opportunities for a clever girl to see and hear all that is best in her own line of work, and to improve herself thereby. These have not been lost upon Miss Clive, and her many well-wishers in Johannesburg hope that she has found a firm footing on the ladder of success.

PROGRESS OF S.A. JEWISH ORPHANAGE.

"If there had been anything to complain about, or criticise, there would have been a larger attendance this evening," said the Chief Rabbi, Dr. J. L. Landau, at the annual general meeting of the South African Jewish Orphanage held at the Hebrew High School on Wednesday evening. He continued, "All is well and they know it."

The report issued the week before shows that the Orphanage has had a good year, but I have already given a summary of some of its interesting features. In connection with finance, the outstanding fact is that within recent years the amount of the bond on Arcadia has been reduced by £10,000 leaving only the sum of £2,650 still owing.

The large sum of £5,236 10s. 8d. which accrued from the Maccabean fete enabled the Committee to pay off £4,100, and in addition to place £1,500 on fixed deposit, only to be used in case of extreme need.

Mrs. A. Bradlow, who has been president for the Orphanage for several years, took the chair at the meeting, and many regrets were expressed at her decision to relinquish the post this year. Mr. W. Hillman, who was returned unopposed as her successor, was with her on the platform, as well as Dr. Landau, Mr. B. Mendelsohn, Mr. B. Moss-Morris and Mr. Percy Cowen.

Mrs. Bradlow read an admirably

worded presidential report. She referred to the present satisfactory condition of the Orphanage, and to the success of their efforts to provide a home for the orphans where they could be trained as good citizens and good Jews, yet there were no hampering rules and restrictions, and each child could develop on individual lines. Some people disagreed with this policy, but they had the majority with them. In spite of other claims on the community she felt sure that the Orphanage would never lack support. In conclusion she paid a tribute to those who had helped them in their work, including the Rev. Beckman who gave them instruction in Hebrew, Miss Pearl Adler who taught them dancing, the many generous donors of gifts in kind, the medical board, Mr. Percy Cowen, the organising secretary, and Mr. and Mrs. Scher, who are in charge of the Orphanage.

The Chief Rabbi followed, and his opening sentences have already been quoted. He went on to speak of the Orphanage as an institution—the Jewish Aged Home is another—which reflects great credit on the local Jewish community. He said that although he often passed strictures on them, he knew that Johannesburg Jews were very generous. He wished they were also religious, but unfortunately it was difficult to place the orphans with business houses where they were able to keep their sabbath.

Dr. Landau also referred to the Boy Scouts and Girl Guides of the Orphanage in favourable terms, saying that the results of such training had been distinctly beneficial.

After the chairman had moved the adoption of the report and balance sheet, Mr. B. Mendelsohn, the hon. treasurer, told the meeting that the monthly revenue had already fallen off, and renewed efforts were necessary to maintain the success achieved during the period under review. Many subscribers had moved to other neighbourhoods without notifying their change of address. He believed the subscription could be raised in the case of the well-to-do.

Mr. Moss-Morris, the hon. secretary, was applauded when he proposed that Mrs. Bradlow be made an hon. life president. He said that they could not afford to lose her services, and must bind her to the institution. The proposal was carried unanimously.

WAYS AND MEANS.

Mr. W. Hillman, the new chairman, said at the Orphanage meeting that "a beggar's purse is always empty." They had to keep on begging to maintain the institution. He referred to the generous gifts in kind, especially that of the wholesale butchers who contributed monthly over 2,000 lbs. of meat.

Mr. Hillman favours a sliding scale of subscriptions, ranging from 12s. per annum to £5, but this suggestion did not find approval at the meeting; one member, Mr. Jacobson, emphatically objecting to it. He

said that the well-to-do could be approached for donations, a source of revenue which has considerably decreased of late, according to the financial report.

The executive officials already mentioned were returned unopposed, and also Mr. B. Kaumheimer as vice-chairman. The ballot for the committee resulted in the election of Mesdames H. Light, A. Nathan, S. Raphaely, W. Sacks, P. Sand; Advocates Harry Morris and M. Frank; Messrs. A. S. Joffe, P. Lochoff, Isaac Marks, A. Sieradzki, Leopold Snider and A. Ullman.

AT THE GUILD.

The Dramatic Section of the Jewish Guild are now rehearsing and will soon produce two one-act plays. The first is the uncanny but very clever work of W. W. Jacobs, "The Monkey's Paw." This has been done before by the Guild players, and must have been successful to justify its revival. It was first played in Johannesburg at the Standard Theatre by John Lawson of china breaking proclivities. I believe that the nightly smash of plates in one of his melodramas, drew large audiences.

The Guild will also put on Kirton's farce comedy, "Taming a Lion." There is much talent in the Guild's Dramatic Section, and good houses are the rule when they present an attractive programme.

The monthly cabaret dances are proving very popular, and so they should be for the dining-hall provides a very attractive setting for any festivity; the floor is good and the catering excellent yet inexpensive.

The National Council of Women, an undenominational body, now hold their monthly meetings at the Jewish Guild and several non-Jewish functions have been held there lately.

The lecture promised by Mr. Percy Hutchinson for Sunday evening has been postponed till his return from his tour of the coast towns.

NUTSHELL COMMENTS.

Dr. Leon Bramson will address a Jewish mass meeting early in July. He is in close contact with many sympathisers on the Rand, who will doubtless aid his mission in practical fashion when the time comes. Meanwhile Johannesburg Jewry may be said to be divided between those who think that all funds for overseas should be diverted to Palestine, and those who claim that a fair share must be given to the relief of suffering co-religionists in Eastern Europe.

There was a very successful afternoon concert at the Jewish Guild on Tuesday, held under the auspices of the Johannesburg Women's Zionist League. An excellent programme was provided by Miss E. Schatz and Miss Joyce Rosenthal (violin and piano), Mrs. Edelstein (contralto),

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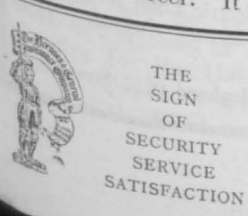
