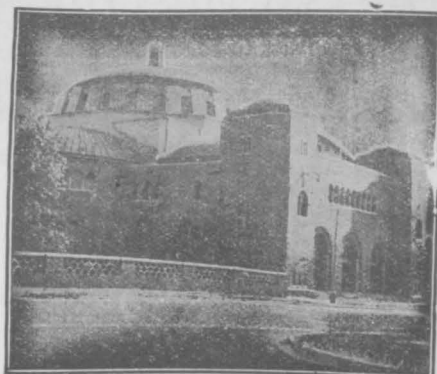

### RADIUM FUND.

The appeal by the Johannesburg Hospital for funds to purchase radium for the relief of sufferers has been launched and is meeting with great success.

This fund was inaugurated as a result of a donation by Messrs. Schneier and London, who promised to donate £1,000 if nineteen other similar donations were received, and after a short while they forwarded their cheque for £500 to inaugurate the fund.

### UNITED TALMUD TORAHS.

The first annual general meeting of the United Talmud Torah Schools of Johannesburg was held at the Jewish Guild, on Sunday last, 3rd March, when Dr. J. L. Landau, Chief Rabbi, Federated Synagogues of the Witwatersrand, presided over a fair attendance. He was supported on the platform by Messrs. B. P. Marks and P. Patley (vice-presidents), L. K. Hurwitz (hon. treasurer), Max Geffen (hon. secretary), Mr. I. W. Schlesinger and the secretary, Mr. M. H. Kam.

The report issued reflected that since the inception of the Union on 10th March, 1927, considerable progress had been made and seven

schools with a roll of 650 children and employing 28 teachers were now under the jurisdiction of the Union. In addition the Union is responsible for giving Hebrew instruction to the 700 children attending the Jewish Government School, and grants a monthly subsidy to the Johannesburg Hebrew College.

Dealing with the financial side of the Union the last year reflects that an amount of £10,000 is required for the upkeep of the Union and its constituent schools, and steps are now being taken to wipe out the deficit of over £2,000 which occurred last year, and to date the appeal for funds has resulted in an amount of over £500 being secured.

Speeches were made by Dr. J. L. Landau, Messrs. B. P. Marks, B. Patley, I. W. Schlesinger, Max Geffen, W. Hillman and L. L. Belcher, and a most inspiring address on the educational needs of the community was delivered by Madame Bernstein-Kahn, a recent arrival from Palestine.

The adoption of the reports and accounts was carried unanimously, and thereafter the election for executive officers was proceeded with and resulted as follows:—President, Mr. B. P. Marks, B.A.; vice-presidents, Messrs. L. K. Hurwitz and Z. Cohen; hon. treasurer, Mr. H. Wittert; hon. secretary, Mr. J. Witkin; trustees, Messrs. B. Patley, M. Reuid and H. Schlapobersky.

### HEBREW ORDER OF DAVID.

Still another town must be added to the steadily growing list of places possessing lodges of the Hebrew Order of David, for on Sunday last, the 3rd inst., Randfontein was consecrated under the name "Philip Silbert Lodge No. 24, H.O.D." Grand Lodge officers journey from Johannesburg to perform the various ceremonies and visitors were present from many distant parts. Large contingents of brethren from the lodges on the Witwatersrand made the journey by special buses, and the consecration of the lodge took place in the Robinson Hall, Randfontein.

At 3 p.m. the Grand Lodge officers and visiting delegates arrived at Randfontein and were welcomed by the patron, Mr. Philip Silbert, the reply being given by Wor. Bro. M. J. Shindler, grand president. A tea reception followed and thereafter a photo was taken to commemorate the occasion. ### JEWISH BOARD OF DEPUTIES.

On Sunday last, 24th February, the usual monthly meeting of the S.A. Jewish Board of Deputies was held, and it was agreed to appoint a deputation to interview the Minister of the Interior with a view to obtaining a reduction in the naturalisation fee.

Discussion also took place with regard to the reply received from the Union Government to the representations made by the Board on the subject of the anti-Jewish excesses in Roumania, and further action was left to the Executive Committee.

A decision was also arrived at to hold the next congress of the Board of Deputies in Cape Town towards the end of 1929.

An excellent report was received from the Jewish Employment Bureau to the effect that 327 applicants had been found employment, and further steps are being taken in connection with the suggested settlement of Jews on the land. A luncheon is to be tendered to the Jewish farmers who will be present in Johannesburg during the Rand Agricultural Show Week, and Jewish farmers are requested to advise the Secretary, P.O. Box 1538, of their address in Johannesburg.

### JEWISH ORPHANAGE.

The monthly bulletin issued by the S.A. Jewish Orphanage shows 214 children under the charge of the committee, and during the month 70 senior children were invited to witness the great Indian film "Shiraz" at the Astoria Kinema, which was enjoyed by all.

Revenue during the month amounted to £305 11s. 3d., and arrangements are now being made to hold the annual general meeting.

The synagogue at Arcadia has been beautifully refurnished and fitted up, and the committee tender their very grateful thanks to Mr. K. Sieradzki for the ark, perpetual lamp, and the electric light fittings; to Mrs. A. Nathan for the silk mantle for the "Sephor Torah"; to Mr. I.
