There can be little doubt that the great Sirota will receive the most enthusiastic welcome from Jewry throughout South Africa, and the presence of the great Cantor will fill the city to overflowing, especially when it is known that Mr. Harry Bloom, of Cape Town, who is the head of the syndicate, proposes bringing from England a special synagogue choir to accompany Sirota on his South African

REUBEN BRAININ CAMPAIGN.

Unprecedented scenes were witnessed on Sunday night at the Astoria Kinema, where Reuben Brainin was advertised to speak on Palestine, Soviet Russia and the Jewish Future," when nearly 2,000 people struggled to gain admission, and despite appeals by a number of leaders to avoid what might have proved later to be a terrible disaster, the management were compelled to call in the police authorities, and the organisers of the Reuben Brainin campaign arranged an overflow meeting at the Jewish Guild, which, within a few minutes of the announcement being made, was packed to the doors.

Reuben Brainin's address was listened to with the greatest interest by the hundreds who were present, and he described the conditions in Palestine and Soviet Russia, speaking in Yiddish, and making a stirring appeal to the Jews of South Africa, to assist in solving the Jewish problem in Russia.

The lecture was further illustrated by a film, showing the Jewish agricultural colonies in Russia, in which Johannesburg had an opportunity of seeing a photographic record of what achievements had been made during the four years that the back to the land movement had been organised.

The lecture was under the auspices of the Reuben Brainin Campaign Committee, Mr. Bernard Alexander presiding.

A JEWISH MUSICAL EVENING.

The Johannesburg City Hall was filled last Saturday night by the Jewish community to hear Madame Olga Ryss, the talented soprano, who rendered songs in Hebrew and Jewish, and who was on the platform throughout the whole evening. She sang a complete programme, receiving assistance in different items from a choir, Mr. J. Connell at the organ and Mr. Hyman Sachs at the piano. Whilst the choir consisted of a small number, it was nevertheless a wellbalanced ensemble, and was conducted by Rev. T. Grossberg of the Wolmarans Street Synagogue.

Madame Ryss was heard to advantage in "Eili Eili," the famous Jewish song of mourning, and singing, as she did, without a break throughout the evening, the artiste must be congratulated upon the very high level of her vocalism.

JEWISH GUILD.

Once again the Musical Art Section of the Jewish Guild have commenced rehearsals, with a view to presenting a show towards the end of June, and those of the members who remember the successful 1928 Musical Revellers will look forward with added interest to the work of the new section.

There will be a repeat performance of the Grand Guignol Night recently held, when three one-act plays, being "Lithuania" (by Rupert Brooke), "The Sisters' Tragedy" (by Richard Hughes) and "Green Chartreuse" (by Chester D. Heywood, will again be presented, thereby enabling those members who could not see the performance previously to see same on this occasion.

On Sunday last, 5th May, Dr. Bernstein Kahan lectured to the Fordsburg-Mayfair Zionist Society.


RADIUM FUND.
