“The Position in Palestine.”

An excellent step that has been taken lately by the Dorshei Zion Association is that of posting pamphlets dealing with Zionist questions to members. The Association points out that it is the desire of the committee that all members and friends should keep abreast with the latest developments in the movement and the position in Palestine, and that there is a need for this will not be denied by any right-thinking person. The first pamphlet has already been distributed. It is one of a series that has been published by the Jewish Agency since its formation, and under the title, “The Position in Palestine,” contains several admirable speeches on this subject by Dr. Chaim Weizmann. The Association, I understand, is in possession of a large number of these pamphlets, all of them touching upon different phases of the movement. They should certainly be of great benefit to all concerned and will no doubt act as a means of creating a more intense interest in Zionism generally and in the development of Palestine.

The Talmud Torah.

We have been asked to draw the attention of readers to the Talmudical Classes which have now been established by the United Hebrew Schools for boys who have completed their seventh standard. Those attending

these classes, we have been told, will also be prepared for the Junior Certificate and Matriculation Hebrew Examinations. Such classes, as will be realised, are both valuable and necessary, and will, we have no doubt, be given the attention and support which they deserve.

In connection with this, we have been asked by the Secretary of the United Hebrew Schools to make the following statements with regard to the present position of the Talmud Torah. There are now 280 pupils at the Institution and these have been divided into seven classes. The syllabus adopted, is that which has been arranged by the Board of Hebrew Education.

An innovation that was effected at the beginning of this year was the establishment of a morning class where English and Hebrew are taught. This is a Sub-A class and provides an opportunity for children from their earliest years to study both languages simultaneously instead of beginning their lessons in Hebrew at a much later stage. It is the intention of the authorities to establish ultimately a primary school of this nature, which will come under the guidance of the Cape School Board. These facts are of particular interest in view of the discussion which took place at the Propaganda Conference on Sunday and the suggestion which was put forward by several that such schools be established.
