Estate of the Late Mr. Hyman Liberman.

Wilner Society Concert.

A very entertaining programme had been drawn up, the first half of which consisted of a violin solo by Miss S. Kudowitzky, songs by Miss Helena Rabowsky (Miss L. Kudowitzky at the piano), recitations by Mr. Lasman and Mr. Anzinsky, and the second half of which was composed of songs by Miss Rabowsky (with Mr. Kurland as accompanist), national songs by Mr. B. Rome, a recitation and a sketch in English by Miss L. Kudowitzky and a violin solo by Mr. Eberlin. The concert proved a most successful affair from every point of view.

Young Israel Oratorical Contest.

Jewish Candidates at Municipal Elections.

Mr. Alexander at Muizenberg

There was a large gathering at the Muizenberg Synagogue last Sunday evening, when, under the auspices of the Muizenberg Young Israel Society, Mr. Advocate Morris Alexander delivered an address on "Jewish Laws and Customs in Regard to Children."

Mr. Alexander dealt with his subject very comprehensively, revealing an intimate knowledge and understanding of it. He dwelt on the Jewish belief, as expressed in the Talmud, in the existence of spirits of good and evil advising the child before birth, of the significance of the day of its birth and the importance with which males were accredited. He spoke of the many customs which had come into being for the furtherance of the child's physical, religious, and cultural development, most of which were to be found in written form in the Talmud.

At the conclusion of the lecture the Rev. Isaacs expressed the thanks of the gathering to Mr. Alexander for a most illuminating address. The meeting closed with the singing of the Hatikvah.

Mr. Mierowsky Addresses the Ladies.

There was a gathering of some thirty ladies present at a meeting of the Bnoth Zion Association held in the Zionist Hall last Tuesday afternoon, when Mr. D. Mierowsky, of the S.A. Board of Jewish Education, delivered an address.

Mrs. F. Clouts, Chairlady of the Society, presided, and at the outset briefly introduced the speaker to the gathering.

Mr. Mierowsky, in the course of a very fine speech, made an earnest appeal to the ladies to come forward and take an active interest in the furtherance of Hebrew education. He expressed the hope that the ladies would form a general committee to assist in the work in Cape Town.

At the conclusion of the address a discussion took place, in which Mesdames Henry Harris, M. Schrire, S. Gordon, Herman and M. Zuckerman participated.

During the afternoon tea was served and a most pleasant and instructive function concluded at about 5 o'clock.
