THE KEREN HAYESOD IN ENGLAND.

Reports are not yet to hand of the results of the London "drive" for the Keren Hayesod, which was arranged for the fortnight—May 20th to June 3rd. It is evident, however, that the arrangements were on an unprecedented scale, and we hope to be able to report equally striking results.

A large number of voluntary canvassers was enrolled for the purpose of a house to house canvass. Arrangements were made for suitable addresses to be delivered in the Synagogue during Shevuoth. The Jewish Chronicle and Jewish World gave prominent editorial support. The Chief Rabbi, Dr. Hertz, issued an appeal in connection with the campaign to the Jews of England, in which he pointed out that both Zionists and non-Zionists must answer the call; the Zionist so as to demonstrate that his love of Zion was more than a phrase, and the non-Zionist so as to help Great Britain "in the arduous, the glorious task entrusted to her by the civilised nations of the world."

KEREN HAYESOD IN VARIOUS COUNTRIES.

Activity is well maintained in Poland. In the month of April returns from 136 centres were received.

Dr. Feiwel's recent visits to Czecho Slovakai and Austria have proved very beneficial to the Keren Hayesod work in those areas.

A campaign has recently been conducted in Finland under the direction of Dr. Wilensky. The results at Helsingfors were poor owing to an economic erisis; but in Abo and Viborg they were very good.

An energetic campaign is proceeding in Bessarabia, especially at Kishineff.
