At the latest meeting of the Executive held on the 19th August, Mr. J. Jowell (Paarl Y.M.S.) was elected assistant business secretary of the Judean.

THE YOUNG ISRAEL CENTRAL EXECUTIVE OF THE TRANSVAAL.

Report of Recent and Coming Activities.

The close of the year finds our executive in a very sound position. We began activities about a year ago with six societies represented; to-day we are pleased to record that we have doubled the number of societies represented, and we have every hope of further additions within a month or six weeks.

Under our auspices three societies have been formed, viz., Randfontein, Roodepoort, and Pretoria, and our executive must in this regard highly compliment Mr. Heymann, representing Krugersdorp on our council, in taking the initiative in forming the socie-

ties at Randfontein and Roodepoort.

Having established ourselves thus firmly with prospects of immediate further successes, the council thought that the time had come to confirm the action of the conference in electing the Chief Rabbi, Dr. J. L. Landau, the hon. president. A deputation, consisting of Messrs. N. Metz (president), S. Joffe (vice-president) and H. Rajak (hon. secretary) was received by the Chief Rabbi at his residence on Wednesday evening, the 22nd August. Dr. Landau expressed his pleasure at the success we had achieved, and consented to lend his moral support in the furtherance of our executive's labours and to accept the position of hon. president.

Dr. Landau discussed with the deputation many problems and features of the Young Israel Movement, and when our members retired it was with many useful hints and a definite programme upon which to base

further activities.

Our executive is to be congratulated upon the adoption of the bronze Young Israel badge by the Cape Judean Central Executive, making it thus the universal insignia of Young Israel throughout South Africa. The possessor of a badge therefore belongs not only to his individual society, but is a member of the whole movement.

Johannesburg Young Israel Society.

The annual National Fund Stamp Day, held on the 22nd July, proved very satisfactory, the total realised—£128 odd—exceeding last year's by several pounds.

The August activities of the society included no social, as the committee was desirous that there be no clashing with the great activities at present going on in the city for the "Arabian Nights Fête." A very interesting lecture was delivered by Mr. Alfred L. Cohn on Sunday, 12th August, on "Great Jewish Statesmen." The lecturer dealt with some of the many great men whom our race has given the world, and prominent in his lecture were Leon Gambetta, Luzzatto, Ferdinand Lassalle, Disraeli, Jehuda Benjamin, and many others.

On the following Sunday we had great pleasure in entertaining a party from the Germiston Y.I.S. at an inter-debate. For the society, Mr. Saron moved that "Jewry has sufficiently responded to the offer given them by the Mandate." He dealt at length on the economic position of the Jews in the world to-day, especially in Eastern Europe, and showed how most Jews had done their utmost for their nation and their country. Mr. Joffe (Germiston) opposed, and pointed out that there were still many who were not yet moved by the stirring calls of our leaders. The seconders were Messrs. Sapire (Johannesburg) and Friedman (Germiston). After a discussion, which had to be shortened, owing to the fact that the visitors had arrived late, a vote was taken, the decision being, by a narrow margin, in favour of the Johannesburg Society.

On the same evening the committee and its visitors were entertained by Mrs. T. Amoils at her residence, where a very pleasant evening was spent. The committee, through this medium, wishes to thank Mrs. Amoils for her kindness.

On the occasion of the New Year the executive and committee greet their members and fellow-Zionists, and extend to them best wishes for their success in all activities. At the same time an earnest appeal is made to all for even more energy to be displayed during the coming year than ever before in Young Israel work. South African Young Israel is to-day a united brotherhood, strong and energetic,

and sincere hopes are expressed that it will make a name for itself indelible in the history of the Zionist movement.

HOUSES FOR CHALUZIM.

MR. J. CHANOCK'S GENEROUS GIFT.

Our readers will no doubt recall the reports which appeared recently in the South African press of the sad death of Mr. Theodore Chanock, a South African student of great promise at Edinburgh University. This young man was the son of Mr. J. Chanock, formerly of Bloemfontein, but now resident in Capetown, and this gentleman, who is keenly interested in the Jewish re-settlement of Palestine, has decided to perpetuate his son's memory in a noteworthy manner in Erez Israel by providing funds for the erection of one or more houses to be occupied by a family or families of Chaluzim free of rent or at a very small rental. He has already forwarded to the S.A. Zionist Federation the amount of £100 towards this object, and the Federation is communicating with the Jewish National Fund in Palestine to make all arrangements for the erection of a house or houses on National Fund land on the lines of Mr. Chanock's wishes.

As soon as all details are available from Palestine, including the total cost of such building, Mr. Chanock will provide the remainder of the amount required to

carry his scheme to fruition.

This fine example of practical Zionism set by Mr. Chanock (who is, incidentally, a shareholder in the S.A. Palestine Enterprise (Binyan) Corporation, Ltd.) is one worthy of the emulation of Jews of means in all parts of the world, and we trust that similar contributions towards the Yishuv will be forthcoming from Zionists both from South Africa and overseas.
