

The past week has been a very busy one in the carrying out of a number of activities. Several important functions have served not only to increase appreciably the receipts of the Carnival but have constituted attractive features in themselves.

Mock Congress.

July 3, 1931.

This was the outstanding event of the week and proved a big success in every respect. It was entertaining, instructive and financially successful. A special report of this event appears elsewhere in this issue.

The S.A. Zeire Zion, who were responsible for this function, have already been approached to give repeat performances of the Mock Congress in Johannesburg and on the Reef and, judging from the intense enthusiasm with which the performance on Monday evening was received, there is every reason to believe that the repeat performance will be accorded as hearty a welcome as that which was given to it on Monday night.

Although the final accounts are not yet to hand, it is expected that the net proceeds of Monday's performance will exceed £40.

The Zeire Zion are already busy preparing for the Jewish play which it is intended to stage at the Standard Theatre on September 21st (Motze Yom Kippur). The play to be staged is Sholom Aleichem's famous masterpiece, "Es iz shwer tzu zein a Yid" (It is difficult to be a Jew). In addition, the Zeire Zion are also making plans for holding an artistic evening at the Jewish Guild later in September. All these functions are part of the Zeire Zion contribution to the Carnival effort.

Grand Concert at Germiston.

Under the auspices of the Germiston Women's Zionist League, a Grand Concert was held last Sunday night at the Rialto Kinema, and was attended by a large and enthusiastic audience, and proved an artistic social and financial success.

Cartoon gave a delightful solo in Yiddish, which was followed by a Hebrew quartette, "Zocharti Loch" (from the Rosh Hashonah Service) sung by Mesdames Wall and Goodman and Messrs. B. Rabinowitz and L. D. Wall. Miss T. Weinfeld sang some fine solos both in English and Yiddish. Then the entire company sang "Sweet and Low." The programme was concluded with the singing of "Boruch Habo." In addition to the above-mentioned artistes, Miss Lily Goldberg and Mr. S. Couzin assisted in the chorus.

The committee desire to thank the Music Club for their delightful performance, Mr. Shapiro for the loan of the Bioscope, Messrs. Wicks, Ltd., Honey Bee Candy Co. and Crown Confectioners, for sweets which they kindly donated and which were sold during the evening, also to the Transvaal Paper Co. for their contribution of cardboard boxes used for the sale of sweets.

This most entertaining and instructive function yielded over £30 net.

Under the auspices of the Parktown Branch, Mrs. S. M. Gordon is organising a function at her residence on August 15th.


