## RALLY OF WORKERS.

The third rally of the General Committee of the Carnival will take place at the Carlton Hotel on Wednesday, the 19th inst., at 8.15. Mrs. Leopold Greenberg, chairlady of the Carnival Executive, will preside.

Reports of the activities of the various branches of the League and other bodies participating in the Carnival effort will be heard. The meeting will also have to discuss a number of recommendations which the Executive is bringing forward in connection with the preparations for the Carnival itself. Of particular interest will be the question of the fancy dress costumes. It is intended to organise a big pageant of Jewish historical costumes grouped according to types and periods in Jewish history, each group to be allocated to the various stalls, which will constitute an important feature of the Carnival. The final allocation of these groups will be made at this rally.
