A PREGNANT text out of which may be deduced many a lesson, many a moral. In the case of Lord Melchett the action is a shining symbol forming a beacon light in the firmament, now darkly be-clouded, of Jewish destiny. It is an act of great personal courage and a sign of great spiritual travail. He, whose grandfather sought deliberately to eradicate every root association with Jewry out of his children and grandchildren. And now, safely baptised with none save self-sought links with Jewry, the grandson, with a deliberation infinitely more meaningful, infinitely more heroic, turns back again into the womb of Israel.

There was courage in the grandfather Ludwig Mond. For it needs courage (if a man have but a soul at all) to leave Israel. But it is well buttressed with pomp and defiance and fine high words; it is only much later the terrible loneliness comes. The apostate sells his soul for a mess of pottage. Uneasy is his spirit. He thinks to escape his dark Jewish destiny and, maybe, finds it—outside him-

self. But he cannot evade the grim unforgetting monitor within himself. It is a malignant ghost poisoning and corrupting his whole. spiritual existence. It holds his soul in thrall, mocking him and making him despise himself.

Ludwig Mond needed courage to depart from us, but it fades to a species of cowardice by contrast with his grandson's bravery. There are no glittering compensations in the return. None save an end to loneliness. A humble return to humility. Lord Melchett knew what we Jews have to offer him. A tragic then, a tragic now and, mayhap, a tragic future. He has accepted the apparent personal doom. His reward is the paradoxical inversion of the saying quoted above he has exchanged his mess of pottage for his soul!

There are thousands of "assimilated" Jews in the world to-day watching the German tragedy. In them, heart and mind are in black despair. To them, Lord Melchett's heroic gesture will be most clearly understood.

A Zionist Society for Jagersfontein and Fauresmith

An important step forward in the Zionist Movement in this town has just been made. At a meeting held in Jagersfontein on Sunday, 25th June, it was unanimously decided to reorganise the Zionist Society, and Mr. E. Burman, the former chairman of the society, was re-elected to the chair, whilst Mr. D. Mazabow was appointed hon. secretary and treasurer. On Sunday, July 16th, at the Phoenix Hotel, Jagersfontein, a further meeting was held jointly with Fauresmith representatives, when it was decided to amalgamate, and to constitute the Jagersfontein-Fauresmith Zionist Society with the following honorary officers and committee: Chairman, Mr. E. Burman; Vice-Chairman, Mr. B. Phillips (Fauresmith); Hon. Secretary and Treasurer, Mr. D. Mazabow; Committee: Messrs. P. Jassinowsky and A. Orelowitz, Dr. L. Jolson and Mrs. S. Horwitz, all of Fauresmith, and Messrs. G. Heyman and J. Immermann, and Mesdames E. Burman and S. Sussman, all of Jagersfontein. The membership of the amalgamated body stands at close upon forty.

The committee promptly met at the residence of Mr. Burman and worked out a plan of activities for the society. The first claim upon its attention was the S.A. Fund for German Jewry, and plans for a collectioin were forthwith made. Another fixture decided was a social function to be held on Sunday, August 6th, for the benefit of the Jewish National Fund.

Rabbi Kosowsky, who is wellknown throughout Poland, is coming to South Africa, accompanied by his wife and daughter.
