New Aspect of Musical Life in Germany

A NEW aspect of musical life in Germany and especially in Berlin is making its appearance, in consequence of the radical and sudden change of conditions of life. The Jewish artists being with a few exceptions unable to practise their art in public, are making the best of their rather desperate position by organisingnecessarily on a restricted scalemusical activity among themselves. They have founded a new "Kulturbund" with the view of building up Jewish opera, theatre, concerts, lectures, scientific courses, etc., exclusively for the Jewish public. It is expected that the Jewish opera will be opened in the autumn. The concerts have already been started. Michael Taube, a conductor of high rank who for some years has been winning laurels as a specialist in the chamber orchestra, has founded a new Jewish orchestra. Dr. Kurt Singer, formerly Intendant of the Municipal Opera, a choral conductor of considerable experience and ability, is already training a cappella chorus. Both Taube and Singer have recently combined their orchestral and choral forces, and have given several concerts in the New Synagogue, Prinzregenten-Strasse, making a profound impression by their excellent work.

Under the patronage of the Berlin Jewish Congregation two malevoice choirs have been formed, composed exclusively of solo singers and of opera singers who have lost their positions. In normal times it would have been impossible to form a chorus of such incomparable excellence, because the eminent singers in its ranks would formerly never have dreamt of singing in a chorus. These two choral bodies will be sent on a tour in neighbouring countries. Their programmes have consisted partly of liturgical, synagogue music, and partly of Jewish folksongs in excellent and highly effective arrangements.

A number of high-class chamber music concerts have been given in suitable and commodious private residences. Two new Jewish string quartets have been formed in Berlin—the Partos Quartet and the Neue Streichquartet Berlin. Each has made a highly encouraging semi-public debut, playing classical as well as modern works. Thus a new quartet by Edmund Partos had its first performance, a substantial and interesting piece in the manner of Bartok. Also the present writer's Quartet Op. 1, written several decades ago, had a successful revival.

Paula Lindberg, long known all over Germany as one of the best of contralto singers, took part in most of the concerts mentioned above. She has now specialised in Jewish folk-song with pianoforte and string-trio accompaniment, and has already at her disposal a valuable repertoire of arrangements. Paul Dessau, Hermann Weil, and Janot Roskin especially excel in this kind of work.

New Place Names in Palestine

INTERESTING DECISIONS BY NAMING COMMITTEE.

THE Naming Committee of the Jewish National Fund has given names to the following places:—

The region along the Haifa Bay belonging to Keren Kayemeth, Bayside Lard Corporation and Haifa Bay Development Company to be called *Emek Zebulum*. This name was chosen on account of the historic link between this land and the tribe of Zebulum, as mentioned in Genesis 49:13: "Zebulum shall dwell at the shore of the sea, and shall be a shore for ships."

Netaim—on land previously known as Qubeiba near Nes Ziona. Smallholders (the settlers were previously known as Vatikim). See 1 Chronicles IV:23.—Meaning Plantations. Gan Shelomo—on Zarnuga land, the locality where Kvuzath Schiller has been established, named after the late Sholomo Schiller.

Kefar Marmorek, named after the late Dr. A. Marmorek. Yemenite settlement on Zarnuga land in the vicinity of Rehoboth. Kefar Bilu—smallholders' settlement (previously known as Intensive neighbourhood) on "Yehudia" and previously known as Agar.

"Yehud" (land in the vicinity of Petah Settlement Organisation). After the Kefar Yehud (historic name in the B.I.L.U. movement). The settlement lies near Rehoboth and Gedera (early homes of the first B.I.L.U. pioneers) on land Tikwa. Yarkona—after the river Yarkon in the vicinity of the settlement near Kefar Malal, land known as Bir Adas, smallholders. (Previously known as Jidro). Ramath Tiomkin—after the late Z. Tion kin. A Revisionist group is on this land in the vicinity of Nethaniya.
