Last Lecture of Mr. Maurice Samuel

SINCE his arrival in the Cape Province, Mr. Samuel has been extremely busy in delivering a great number of lectures at various centres. On Wednesday, November 29th, Mr. Samuel delivered a brilliant lecture to a crowded audience in Capetown. On Sunday, 3rd, an equally successful lecture took place at Strand-Somerset West. On Tuesday, 5th, Mr. Maurice Samuel addressed the students of the Capetown University on "Studentship and Leadership." In addition, arrangements were made for addresses to be delivered to the women, the youth and the general public.

On Monday, December 18th, Mr. Samuel will leave Capetown for Johannesburg, where he will deliver his farewell address at the Selborne Hall on Wednesday, December 20th, on "Bialik: the Hebrew Poet Laureate" (with readings in English and Yiddish). The following day Mr. Samuel will leave by air for Palestine, where he is eagerly awaited by a large number of relatives

Johannesburg Musical Society

Adventitious noises were more than usually obstreperous on Wednesday night and marred a thoroughly enjoyable concert. Some of them, rattling windows and slamming doors, were avoidable, and something should be done to end the racket in President Street when high matters are under discussion in the Selborne Hall.

The big work proved to be a sonata by Pizzeti, an Italian Jew born in 1880; a first hearing suffices to vindicate the modernists. Provided, that is, they have something to say. And Pizzeti is certainly a musical personality and has a very definite music in him. There is an impression of bigness and of an overabundant mass of material, the last movement, in particular, evincing another example of the Jewish too-facile versatility. versatility.

There were enough themes, some of them highly original and promising, to provide half-a-dozen movements. Cav. Danza was at the piano and Bram Verhoef the fiddler. Danza had mastered the intricate score and gave a fine, supple and sensitive reading but his partner was obviously not quite saturated with the spirit of the work. He was much better in a group of testing pieces which included a Rondo by Viewtemps and a Handel larghetto in which he once again proved himself a very fine musiagain proved himself a very fine musician indeed. The ovation he received was fully deserved.

Mr. Rod Gaillard contributed a numher of songs. He is a singer of fine musical intelligence and sensibility and always secures an artistic balance between the emotions and the intellect. But his choice of three numbers by Lowenberg, only mildly interesting, was heardly beauty hardly happy.

Miss Sylvia Shapiro began well with the Bach Gigul from the Suite in G though the too drawing-room-like treat-ment turned out to be the dominant character of her style in the rest of her programme.
