The Herzl Memorial Meeting

THE large hall of the Jewish Guild was filled to capacity on Wednesday evening last when, under the auspices of the local Hebrew-speaking Circle and the Hatechiya Organisation, a meeting was held to commemorate the thirtieth anniversary of the passing of Theodor Herzl, founder of modern political Zionism. Dr. A. Birnbaum presided.

Cantor Berele Chagy chanted most impressively the *Haskorah*. He was assisted by the well-trained choir of the Beth Hamedrash Hagodel under the baton of Mr. Ilchilchik.

Speaking in the name of youth, Mr. Abrahamson, after outlining the outstanding character of Herzl's life and achievements, said that the imperishable ideals of the founder of modern Zionism will always live in the consciences of their people. To-day we are witnessing the practicality of his aims for the revival of Jewry on its ancient territory. Their Movement, to which Dr. Herzl had given so much thought and work, was of tremendous significance to the world at large, for it had created in the Jewish people a new national self-respect and a new freedom of soul. Particularly, Zionism had given more to their present-day youth than was the case a generation ago.

Mr. J. Klevansky, in addressing the audience in Yiddish, called attention to the great epochs in Jewish history. One tangible result of the last war for them was the Balfour Declaration, bringing in its train a more determined effort to redeem the Holy Land. All this could be traced to the labours of Herzl, who, in his days, had difficulty in arousing the spirit of his people to the vital message of their Movement.

Mr. I. J. Kagan declared that Zionism was born on the day the Temple was destroyed. He told of the forerunners of Herzl in preaching the National idea. Where Herzl was great was his bringing forward the old solution of the Jewish problem accompanied by a new method. Herzl had given them a common platform and created the first Jewish parliament. Gifted with a wonderful personality, Herzl managed to captivate the attention of all with whom he came into contact. Like him, they must build with unabated vigour a Jewish Palestine above the strife of parties, for there is no peace for Jews in the diaspora.

Speaking in Hebrew, Mr. M. Rutshtein also told of the historic value of Herzl's activities for his brethren.

During the evening the audience was asked to purchase trees in the Herzl Forest in Eretz Israel.

The meeting concluded with the singing of *Hatikvah*.
