FINE SECOND CONCERT

THERE was an exceptionally good attendance—indicative, one hopes, of the city's interest in good music—at the Wanderers Hall on Sunday evening last, when the Johannesburg Symphony Society, under the baton of Mr. Joseph Trauneck, held its second symphony concert.

The programme on this occasion consisted of Handel's Concerto Grosso No. 3, Beethoven's Concerto No. 3 in C Minor, and Haydn's 7th Symphony in D Major. This latter was perhaps the best complete performance of the evening, though the Largo movement of the Beethoven Concerto seemed to be even better performed. This is a beautiful movement, full of deep feeling, and Mr. Trauneck's interpretation brought out its full quality. Mr. Isidore Epstein was the soloist in this concerto. His performance, as one might expect from this fine player, was technically brilliaht, and he was warmly applauded and recalled by the audience.

Handel's Concerto and Haydn's Symphony were equally warmly received. Mr. Trauneck is undoubtedly a musician of fine sensitivity and especially in the Haydn Symphony was his keen musical sense displayed. He is an unaffected conductor, interested solely in the music he happens to be interpreting, and he has no time for the meretricious showmanship that has spoilt so many South African conductors who seemed to have promise. His orchestra is not yet under complete control, but this is a small imperfection which, one feels sure, will disappear soon. In the Handel Concerto Mr. M. Weinbrenn was the Violino Principal, and Mr. J. Kelly the Flauto solo.

Generally, it was felt that the orchestra had done even better than at the first concert, and there seems little doubt that it will eventually become an excellent combination.
