WOMEN'S ZIONIST WORK DURING THE YEAR

League Annual Meeting on the 23rd

Tuesday, the 23rd inst., will see the
24th annual general meeting of the
Johannesburg Women's Zionist
League. The meeting, which will be
held at the Langham Hotel at three
o'clock, will be attended by represen-
tatives of the numerous affiliated
branches from all parts of the city.

The annual report reveals that in
the recent Keren Hayesod and Wizo
campaigns the women played an im-
portant part, a substantial sum of
money being subscribed by the
women.

It is the aim of the league to
widen the circle of box holders in
Johannesburg, and in this direction,
numbers of families have had Na-
tional Fund boxes placed in their
homes through the efforts of the
branches.

The National Fund was assisted in
the following ways during the year
under review: The concert at the
Metro brought in a substantial con-
tribution towards the Ussishkin
Village; all branches undertook a
series of functions to enable Johan-
nesburg's name to be inscribed in the
Golden Book in honour of the City's
Golden Jubilee. Balfour Day this
year took the form of a tree drive,
and at the Chanukah services col-
lections were made for the National
Fund.

A new branch of the league was
established at Auckland Park and al-
most all the Jewish women in the
district have already joined as mem-
bers. Cultural activity within the
branches continues at an increased
tempo; in several branches reading
circles were combined with sewing
circles for infant welfare centres in
Palestine. Two branches instituted
Oneg Shabbath meetings for child-
ren which have proved successful;
other arranged inter-debates. An
essay competition for young people
was held at the beginning of the year
and proved a fair success.

The league was represented at the
Hebrew Education Conference as
well as at the Conference of the S.A.
Jewish Board of Deputies which took
place in Johannesburg.

The different branches last year
sold 3,318 Shekolim, an increase of
663 over the previous year. Contri-
butions were made towards the
United Talmud Torahs for books to
the Hebrew Kindergarten, and to the
Witwatersrand University for a He-
brew Bursary. The league has a
hundred fully paid up shares in the
Binyan to help settlers in Palestine
to build homes.

The annual report, which is issued
in attractive pamphlet form together
with the different local branch re-
ports and the financial statements
and accounts, is signed by Hedwig
Reinhold, president; Clara Patley,
vice-president; Deborah Katzen,
vice-president; Ray Segal, hon. trea-
surer; Emily Cohen, hon. secretary.

Advocate Maurice Franks

MR. MAURICE FRANKS,
known member of the Rand
has been elevated to the rank of
King's Counsel. This distinction
has been bestowed on him after
two years of service in the Sup-
Court.

Born in London, Mr. Franks
came to this country with his parents
at the age of three. He was educated
at Grey's Institute, Port Elizabeth,
which he studied at the S.A. College
at Cape Town where he received
his B.A. degree. Two years later he
received his Master of Arts degree.
After this he entered the Natal Uni-
versity College and secured his leg-
al degree. He was called to the Bar
in Johannesburg in 1914.

Mr. Franks has been engaged
as counsel in many important civil
and criminal cases in the Transvaal.
The news of his promotion has been
warmly received by his fellow mem-
bers of the Bar.

Mr. Franks has been an out-
standing Jewish communal worker, he
has occupied the position of President
of the S.A. Board of Jewish Educa-
tion from 1933 until a couple of weeks
ago when he was forced to retire from
that position owing to pressure on his
time. He has also been for some time
a prominent member of the S.A. Jew-
ish Board of Deputies, having served
on the Executive Council of this body.
He has taken a very active part in
public affairs, especially in educa-
tional matters. For some time
Mr. Franks was a member of the Wit-
watersrand Central School Board.
