holding the Balfour Declaration

Rev. Norman Bennett, speak-g as a non-Jew, said he was in-lled to utter a few words at this lpless time in Jewish history. For s part he did not look upon this a political meeting, but one of a ligious nature, which had to do with most sacred aspirations of the wish people. Let them remember at the sacred Scriptures were the mmon heritage of them all.

After referring to Biblical pro-ecies with reference to return of a Jew to his ancient Homeland. Rev. mnett said that he had been to destine four times—the first time 1895—and every time he went ere he was greatly impressed with

the result of the rejuvenated Jewish life there.

Rev. Bennett said that an Englishman's word was his bond, and therefore the Balfour Declaration, dependent on the honour of Great Britain, must surely stand to-day.

Mr. A. Menkin, who had recently arrived from East Africa, quoted remarks made by General Smuts in 1930 to the effect that the Balfour Declaration must be carried out, that the British debt of honour to the Jews must be discharged in full at all costs. It had not yet been carried out, the Jewish rights in Palestine had been whittled down.

Some Jewish leaders in Palestine were willing to accept a crumb for fear that otherwise they might get nothing. It was this defeatist policy that had allowed the Royal Commission to issue the report it did. The Jews had got a crumb of land. They were offered 1,800 square miles for a Jewish National Home — about equal to a square block of land lying between Johannesburg and Pretoria.

The Resolutions.

In conclusion, Mr. Menkin moved the following resolutions which were unanimously adopted:

"This meeting of Jewry of Johannesburg and the Reef lodges its emphatic protest against the acceptance by the British Government of the recommendation of the Royal Commission to partition Palestine.

"This meeting further declares that it rejects unconditionally any proposals which aim at depriving the Jewish people of its just and lawful right to recreate Palestine within its historic boundaries as its own State, and calls upon world Jewry to demand that Great Britain should carry on the obligations which it undertook in accepting the Mandate for Palestine from the League of Nations.

"This meeting declares that every Jew or body of Jews that will agree to partition in any form, or will negotiate with the Mandatory on the principle of mutilating any portion of Palestine on both sides of the Jordan, betrays the Jewish people, and does not represent the masses of Jewry."


