Rabbi Meir Berlin..

Rabbi Meir Berlin returns to Cape Town from Johannesburg on Tuesday of next week and in the evening a reception is being given him in the Zionist Hall under the auspices of the Dorshei Zion Association.

Rabbi Berlin, as is well known, is the distinguished leader of the Mizrachi Zionist Organisation. He has for many years held an important position in the Zionist world, being a member of the Actions Committee and a Vice-President of the Zionist Organisation. His fame as an orator and more particularly as an exponent of Zionist ideals has given him world wide fame.

Rabbi Berlin's mission to this country is of a purely propaganda nature. His only purpose is to strengthen Zionist sentiment and to spread a wider understanding of the aims and the problems of the Zionist Movement.

Exhibition of Hebrew and Yiddish Books.

The Exhibition of Hebrew and Yiddish books which, for the last few weeks, has been held at 3, Wesley Street, Cape Town, continues to draw large numbers of interested visitors. The exhibition, it will be remembered, is of books brought to South Africa by Mr. M. Erlichman, representative of the Central Publishing Company of Warsaw.

The visitors on the whole seem to be very impressed by the books—both by their appearance and get up and by the wide range of authors represented. Also, it would appear, the prices are on the whole popular and render the books easily within the reach of most readers.

The exhibition will be open for yet another few weeks. The hours are from 7 p.m. to 11 p.m. and Saturdays and Sundays all day.

Oneg Shabbos.

Going on to deal with the Bible, the speaker stressed the fact that science and bibliogy were not really so far apart as was generally thought. One had to be careful not to read the Bible too literally—one had to read between the lines as it were.

A discussion took place at the conclusion of the lecture. During the afternoon there

was the usual singing and merrymaking, and humorous sketches were read by Messrs. C Laden and Reading.
