The Zionist Conversazione.

An animated discussion on Young Israel problems took place at the Zionist conversazione on Tuesday evening when Mr. S. Nell read a paper on the subject.

Mr. Nell traced the history and outlined the activities of Young Israel in this country. Speaking of the future, he stressed the need for a proper use to be made of the excellent Young Israel organisation which had been built up. Unfortunately, in recent years the S.A. Young Israel Federation had not been able to get out of the groove of doing merely routine work.

Up to the present the functions organised by Young Israel Societies lacked what might be called a scientific basis, and it was on the improving of this state of affairs that the Young Israel Federation had to concentrate. Mr. Nell favoured the formation of a Young Israel Bureau to replace the Young Israel Federation and to deal with this matter.

Speaking of the differences between seniors and juniors, Mr. Nell urged the need for a spirit of give and take, and an appreciation of the fact by those in charge of Young Israel activities that any slight the juniors may have suffered was entirely unintentional, and that by the exercise of tact a good deal more could be achieved than by resort to abuse and wild statements.

Those who participated in the discussion were Messrs. H. Zuckerman, R. Nell, S. Futeran, L. Matthews, Markman, P. Gross, O. Basson, Herman, J Rubik, Cooper, H. B Rogoff, M. Joffe, M. Lange and D. Getz. Mr. Nell, in summing up, dealt with the various points raised.

Mr. and Mrs. D. Getz acted as host and hostess, and at the beginning of the evening a pianoforte solo was given by Miss Freda Rogoff. The evening was brought to a close with the singing of Hatikvah.

Kindergarten Festival Concert.

The spirit of spring and harvest was beautifully revived last Sunday morning at the Shevuoth Concert given by the Bnoth Zion Hebrew Kindergartens at the Zionist Hall.
