

## IN AND AROUND THE PENINSULA

### Lecture on Jabotinsky.

The Revisionist monthly social function which was held in the Zionist Hall on Thursday, the 2nd inst., was very well attended.

The speaker of the evening was Dr. H. W. Altschul, who delivered an address on "Jabotinsky." The speaker, during the course of his address, said that if we wished to understand Revisionism, we had first to study the life of its leader. Unlike other movements, the Revisionist movement was linked up with its founder, and whether Revisionism succeeded or not, Jabotinsky would always be remembered as the one who tried to return to Herzl's "pure" Zionism.

The speaker then gave an outline of Jabotinsky's biography. In Jabotinsky's life one could note two distinct stages—a period of brooding, of deep study and following it a sudden outburst and explosion.

Speaking of the Jewish Legion, of which Jabotinsky was the founder, the speaker said that the Balfour Declaration was partly the result of the Legion. When Dr. Weizmann said that the Jewish soldiers were braver than the "thousand Red Shirts" of Garibaldi, he voiced the opinion of every one who came in contact with the Legion.

In 1920 Jabotinsky joined the Zionist Executive because he felt that Zionism was unsafe in the hands of "the milky Zionists." While away on a Zionist mission in America, the Churchill White Paper was issued. On his return he was asked to sign the document. For a week Jabotinsky, unlike the other members, refused to do so, but finally he was persuaded to affix his signature. It was at that time that he realised that co-operation with those Zionists was impossible. He left the Executive and again a period of brooding followed. Suddenly, in 1925, he appeared as the founder of Revisionism, a movement aiming at a return to Herzl's ideals. Jabotinsky set himself the task of stamping out the "Shtadlanuth" policy and we could rest assured that he would succeed in that.

Mr. R. Kotlowitz also spoke.

Miss R. Cohen entertained the audience with a pianoforte solo. The function terminated with the singing of Hatikvah.

The performance from beginning to end went with a swing, and the humour of the play was well brought out. Miss McCourt showed great ability, not only as a producer but also as a performer, for her acting as Olivia, the leading role, was more than creditable. Others who acquitted themselves very well were Miss Hannah Schwartz as a sentimental and insincere enthusiast, Miss Molly Maister as the stay-at-home, Miss Rose Schur as the maid, Miss Gorfinkel as the make-up specialist, and Herbert Stern as the provincial lad in search of glamour in London. All of them are to be congratulated on some excellent work.
