A CLEAN REFRESHING SHOW.

"The Good Companions" Concert Party now performing in the Peninsula provides a show that is in every way clean, alive and refreshing. From beginning to end it goes with a swing and a slickness that never leave one dull for a moment, and which give at the conclusion a feeling of complete satisfaction.
