

## IN AND AROUND THE PENINSULA

### Farewell to Mr. and Mrs. Satusky.

A farewell reception to Mr. and Mrs. W. Satusky, who are leaving to-day by the "Kenilworth Castle" on a trip to England and Palestine, was held under the auspices of the South Peninsula Zionist Society on Thursday evening, January 18th in the Muizenberg Talmud Torah Hall. There was a large gathering present, included in which were many visitors.

Mr. D. L. Davidowitz, who presided, welcomed the guests amongst whom was Rev. M. I. Cohen, of Bulawayo. He paid a tribute to the sterling services rendered by Mr. Satusky, who was an ex-President of the Society.

Rev. Cohen then addressed the gathering. He spoke of the increased immigration to Palestine and of the attraction which the latter held out to Jews to-day. He showed the inevitable hardships of the Galuth and the inability of the outside world to distinguish between the good and bad elements amongst Jewry.

Eretz Israel provided a contrast. Its culture was uncoloured, its press reflected genuine views unrestrained by external circumstances. In spite of present difficulties, the future depended entirely on Jewry, and the speaker appealed for increased local activity. In conclusion he wished Mr. and Mrs. Satusky a pleasant trip and expressed the hope that they would ultimately settle permanently in Eretz Israel and that others would follow their example.

Mr. B. L. Rubik, speaking in Yiddish, stressed the necessity for personal contact with Palestine. This would lead to an increased knowledge of Jewish questions and to a greater Jewish dignity. Mr. Satusky had been most ardent though reserved in his Zionist activities, and he was glad that he was now going to see the national homeland.

Mr. Satusky briefly responded.

During the evening Miss Greiberg, a visitor to the Cape rendered a piano solo, Miss Myrtle Canin recited, and Cantor M. Katzin obliged with a few songs. Messrs. Max Melmed and Morrie Lazerow gave a humorous cross-talk.

Rabbi Gervis, in proposing a vote of thanks to the speakers and artists, stressed the importance of Palestine in modern Jewish life. The singing of Hatikvah concluded a most successful gathering.

The farewell which was to have been given to Mr. and Mrs. Satusky on Saturday evening last by the Woodstock and Salt River Hebrew Cultural Circle, was cancelled on account of the death of Mr. Mordukhovitz.

### Farewell to Mrs. Berold.

Mrs. S. Gordon also spoke appreciatively of the work done by Mrs. Berold. One could always rely on Mrs. Berold, she said, for tireless co-operation and assistance.

During the morning a presentation was made to Mrs. Berold on behalf of the Committee.

In replying, Mrs. Berold said she was deeply grateful for the expressions of appreciation of her work that she had heard that morning, and for the presentation. She had expected no reward for her work except the pleasure and satisfaction which the performance of it gave.

A large gathering assembled at the Zionist Hall on Wednesday night when the Oneg Shabbos Circle held a farewell reception in honour of Mrs. S. Gordon, who leaves during the week-end by the "Dunluce Castle" on a trip to Palestine.

Dr. S. E. Kark presided and during the course of the evening speeches were delivered by Mr. I. Fine, Mr. Ch. B. Levinsohn, Rev. M. Cohen, Mr. J. Gitlin, Mrs. Ch. Cohen and Rabbi I. M. Gervis. All spoke of the important services rendered to the Zionist Movement in Cape Town by Mrs. Gordon, who had worked selflessly in its interests. Her most noteworthy activities were in the field of Hebrew education, in which she had been a pioneer in the successful running of Hebrew kindergartens. Many a Jewish child in Cape Town had received the rudiments of Hebrew learning at her hands, whilst the many Hebrew kindergartens at present existent in this country followed in the traditions founded by her.

As far as the Oneg Shabbos was concerned, Mrs. Gordon was a member to whom they were sorry to say farewell. She had brought life and spirit into its activities and was to a large extent responsible for its long existence.

Mr. Alexander Lewin, the President of the Hebrew Teachers' Association, took the opportunity on behalf of that body of wishing Mrs. Gordon godspeed. Unfortunately, owing to the holidays which were at present in progress, it had been impossible to arrange a special function for this purpose as they had desired, but he assured Mrs. Gordon that the members of the Association were deeply appreciative of her work and wished her everything of the best on her trip. On behalf of the Association Mr. Lewin presented Mrs. Gordon with a set of books.

Mrs. Gordon suitably responded.

During the evening musical items were rendered by Messrs. S. Reubeni and M. Natas, who gave humorous recitations and readings. There was much community singing and a very jolly atmosphere prevailed until a late hour when the function was concluded.

The Relief Association came into being after the war, and since that time, mainly through the generosity of the United States, who granted substantial subsidies to the movement, and also through the assistance received from the Polish Government, the orphanages have been conducted on a sound financial basis. But now the 30 per cent. American support has been stopped and the subsidies from the Government have fallen off.

Unless help is forthcoming from other sources now, the orphanages must be closed down. The orphanages at present hold 15,000 children of all ages. Not only are they housed and fed, but their education is well looked after.

Mrs. Rabinowitz is one of the best known women in Poland. As one of the virtual heads of the orphanage combine, she occupies a singularly important position in the affairs of the country. She is a woman of culture and considerable linguistic ability and was formerly chairwoman of the Keren Hayesod in Poland. She has been honoured by the Polish Government for her philanthropic work.
