THE OPERA HOUSE.**"This is the Life."**

CHEFALO AND HIS MIDGETS.

Chefalo, the magician and illusionist, who has for years toured the Continent, the British Isles and the United States, opens a season at the Opera House at the Matinee on Monday.

The outstanding quality of Chefalo, the magician, is his boundless energy. His show never flags for a moment. There is never a dull item and his assistants have been so well trained that they display an almost equal amount of energy.

THE ROYAL.**"Manhattan Melodrama."**

Distinctly unusual in theme and essentially dramatic in treatment, "Manhattan Melodrama," starring Clark Gable, William Powell and Myrna Loy, opens on Monday at the Royal.

Adapted from the story, "Three Men," by Arthur Caesar, this new Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer picture tells of three boys raised from childhood in New York. One becomes a priest. Another, Clark Gable, becomes a big-shot gambler, powerful and dramatic figure of the city's night life. The third, William Powell, becomes the district attorney, forced to prosecute his life-long pal for murder. Between them, loved by all of them, is Myrna Loy, Broadway playgirl.

How they meet their problem, through a series of thrilling sequences, forms an entertaining and absorbing story that seems destined to take its place among the better photoplays of the new season.

Capetown Orchestra Activities.

The Cape Town Orchestra will give their usual popular concert in the City Hall this

evening, and again a very interesting programme has been arranged. Miss Beth Mitchel, who is well known for her "Scots Songs" will appear. She will sing "Ombra Mai Fu" (Handel) with the Orchestra, and in the second half "Hame" (Walford-Davies), "Kishmul's Galley" (Kennedy-Fraser, and "Angus Macdonald."

Mr. M. L. de Villiers, the South African composer, will play his "Union Suite" in the first half of the programme. The Suite is in four movements (a) Sunset on Table Bay, (b) The Busy Rand, (c) The Song of the Veld (O.F.S.) and (d) By Stream and Glen (Natal). Among the Orchestral items are "Light Cavalry" (Suppe) and "1812" Overture (Tschaiakowski).

On Sunday evening a unique programme has been arranged, the soloist being Miss Zena Esterhuizen. Piano duets will be played by Blanche Gerstman and Edward Blignaut, the duets they have chosen being "I Cover the Waterfront" and "Yvonne" in the first half of the programme and "Down Sunnyside Lane" and "This is the Day of Days" in the second half. Some of the orchestral items are dances from "Prince Igor" (Borodine), Valse "Artist's Life" and Intermezzo from the Violin Concerto by Godard, solo violin, Alfred J. Gibbs.

On Thursday evening Mr. Heinz Hirschland, pianist, will make his first appearance in South Africa and will play Rachmaninov's Piano Concerto in C Minor. The Symphony will be Beethoven's Symphony No. 4 in B Flat, and by request the Swedish Rhapsody "Sommarwaka" will be played.
