## Mrs. M. Zuckerman's "At Home."

Quite one of the most interesting functions I have attended recently was an "At Home" given by Mrs. M. Zuckerman, the Hon. Life President of the Bnoth Zion Association to the Executive and Committees of the various branches of the Association.

An annual report of thirty years ago, compiled shortly after the death of Dr. Herzl, was read. In it mention was made of the purchase of J.N.F. boxes by the Association which was responsible for the introduction into South Africa of the new familiar "blue box." Mrs. Zuckerman has many interesting records of the early history of the Association and they form too a significant account of the close association of the Zuckerman family with Zionist work in South Africa.

During the evening the opportunity was taken of bidding farewell to Miss Marcia Gitlin, who left on Thursday for Palestine. A presentation on behalf of the Executive was made by the President, Miss M. Oblowitz, who paid tribute to Miss Gitlin's unfailing services both to the Bnoth Zion Association and to the Zionist cause in general. Miss Gitlin made a very suitable reply.

After tea Dr. A. Rosenfeld gave a short account of the significance of the Maccabi World Organisation and of the forthcoming Maccabiad in Palestine.
