

## Vandalism in Gardens Area.

### STONES THROWN AT JEWISH HOMES.

Jewish residents in Upper Mill Street were alarmed on Thursday morning when between two and three o'clock many windows of houses occupied by Jews were broken by stones and bricks thrown at them. In several cases injuries were narrowly averted, some of the stones thrown just missing persons in the houses.

The culprits are as yet unknown, but a member of the community who lives in the Gardens area claims to have seen them passing by in a car and throwing the stones from it.

The incident is being coupled in the minds of most people with an exceedingly unpleasant one which has recurred several times at the Zionist Hall, the massive iron gate leading to the General Jewish Information Bureau having been tampered with and the heavy locks broken. In this case too the culprits are unknown.

## Annual Parliament at Paarl.

### TREMENDOUS ATTENDANCE AT SESSION.

The Cape Zionist Youth Executive held their annual country Parliament at Paarl on 13th and 14th October. The Paarl Junior Zionist Society were in charge of the arrangements. This Parliament was made a general town and country affair and was attended by at least 120 Parliamentarians.

In accordance with the usual custom, a propaganda meeting was held in the Talmud Torah Hall on the Saturday night. The hall was crowded, many seniors attending. Mr. J. Levinsohn, Chairman of the Paarl Junior Zionist Society, was in the chair, and, after welcoming the delegates, called on Rev. H. Strelitz to address the gathering. Speeches of welcome were also delivered by Mr. J. J. Geffen, Acting-Chairman of Paarl Hebrew Congregation; Mr. J. Berman, Chairman of the Talmud Torah; Mr. E. J. Horwitz, Chairman of Paarl Lemaan Zionist Society; Mrs. P. Futeran, Vice-Chairlady of Paarl Ladies' Benevolent Society. The meeting was then addressed by Mr. E. Kluk, Miss E. Matthews and Mr. C. K. Friedlander for the Executive. Musical items were rendered and dances given by members of the Paarl Society.

Caucus meetings of the various parties were held immediately after the conclusion of the meeting.

Parliament was opened at 10 a.m. by Councillor D. Nelson, who acted as Governor-General, and continued until 12.45 p.m. when the delegates adjourned for a luncheon which was provided by the Paarl Ladies' Benevolent Society who are to be congratulated on their efforts. There were at least 250 people present. Toasts were proposed by Mr. C. K. Friedlander: "The Paarl Hebrew Congregation," and replied to by Councillor D. Nelson; Rev. H. Strelitz and Dr. H. Cohen: "The Paarl Junior Zionist Society," by Mr. M. Rabinowitz and replied to by Mr. J. Levinsohn; "The Paarl Ladies' Benevolent Society," by Miss F. Gross and replied to by Mrs. P. Futeran. Mr. E. Kluk was in the chair.

Parliament recommenced at 3 p.m. and continued until 6.30 p.m. There was a constant attendance of not less than 500 during the day, apart from delegates, and the proceedings were watched with great interest throughout. Mr. M. Rabinowitz led the Zionist Socialists, Mr. E. Kluk the Revisionists, Mr. A. J. Volks, the General Zionists and Mr. B. Broudie the Mizrachi. The Government—Zionist Socialists—were defeated by a large majority. The Speaker was Mr. C. K. Friedlander, and Mr. R. Sakinofsky was the Clerk of the House.

An "At Home" was given by the hosts, the Paarl Junior Zionist Society, on Sunday night and was crowded out.

The Parliament was entirely successful and those responsible are to be heartily congratulated.

## A CORRECTION.

## The Excursion Tour to Palestine.

Owing to the continued heavy demand, the final date for receiving bookings for the Palestine excursion has been extended, but prompt and definite application is urged.

The forward journey can be made either on the "Guilio Cesare," leaving Cape Town on February 7th, or on the "Duilio," leaving Cape Town on March 7th. The journey to Genoa takes sixteen days, and from there passengers will be transhipped on the day of arrival to the large liners of the Lloyd Triestino Company for the journey to Palestine. Provided there are no fewer than one hundred passengers, the boats will go direct to Jaffa or Haifa.

The return journey will be over the same route as the forward journey, but the excursionists will be able to arrange their movements after Palestine to suit themselves, provided they are back in South Africa within twelve months of departure.

The return fares are:—First Class £140; Second Class: £75; Tourist: £45. This includes passage from Cape Town to Genoa, and Genoa to Palestine, and return to Cape Town via Genoa and Marseilles. It does not include passage from Genoa and Marseilles to London. Passengers desirous of visiting London will have to pay their own passage from Marseilles to London and return to Marseilles or Genoa in order to embark on there on their return journey to Cape Town.

Next Spring is likely to witness both an unprecedented tourist season and a long series of events of the most absorbing and fascinating interest. Arrangements are being made for South African visitors to receive all assistance and facilities, and they are assured of the warmest welcome.
