Obituary.

Rev. HORACE R. ISAACS.

The death occurred in the Simon's Town Hospital on Sunday morning of the Rev. Horace Rudgart Isaacs, of Bristol, Albertyn Road, Muizenberg, at the age of seventy-five.

Educated in London, Mr. Isaacs gained several medals and scholarships, and then became a pupil teacher at his school. He studied Rabbinics and Talmudies privately, and was later ordained a Jewish minister by the Very Rev. Dr. Adler, Chief Rabbi of the British Empire.

He came to Kimberley in 1889 to fill the position of Jewish minister of the Griqualand West Area, and three years later took up the position of Rabbi at the Park Station Synagogue, Johannesburg, where he stayed for seven years.

While he was in Johannesburg, he took a prominent part in the inauguration of the first Jewish school in the Transvaal, was a foundation member of the Johannesburg Zionist Society, and was connected with the Jewish Helping Hand Society.

From there he was recalled to Kimberley in 1899, and went through the siege of Kimberley, being mentioned in despatches by Lord Roberts for the valuable work he did

Mr. Isaacs was the first Jewish minister in the British Empire to be so mentioned. He also received the Kimberley siege medal. He took an active part in School Board affairs, and was Vice-Chairman of the Kimberley School Board for seventeen years.

After a service of thirty-eight years, he retired through ill-health in 1927 to Muizenberg, where he became very popular amongst all sections of the community.

Mr. Isaacs is survived by a widow, seven sens, three daughters, and five grandchildren.

The funeral tok place on Sunday afternoon at Muizenberg and was very largely attended. The coffin was taken into the Synagogue where Rev. Gordon, of Wynberg, delivered an impressive Hesped. Cantor M. Katzin intened the Hazkorah.

At the graveside Cantor Katzin and Rev. I. Frank officiated.

The J.N.F. Campaign.

Muizenberg Reception to Dr. Benzion Shein.

The combined Societies of Muizenberg, comprising the Men's Zionist Society, the Bnoth Zion Association, and the Hebrew Congregation held a reception to Dr. Benzion Shein on Tuesday evening, 16th May, at the Rio Grande Hotel. There was a large and enthusiastic audience present.

Mr. D. L. Davidowitz, who presided, extended a very warm welcome to Dr. Shein, and also to Adv. M. S. Comay, Secretary of the Keren Kayemeth Campaign, who accompanied him. Mrs. R. Movsovic, Chairlady of the Bnoth Zion Association, and Mr. W. Satusky, Chairman of the Hebrew Congregation, also welcomed Dr. Shein.

Adv. Comay, in addressing the gathering, expressed himself as being very happy to be associated with Dr. Shein. The latter was a protégé of Ussishkin, who realised that he had all the qualities which made him an ideal emissary for the purpose for which he had come to South Africa.

Referring to the conditions in Palestine at present, the speaker pointed out that in spite of the hectic commercial activity and prevailing boom conditions, there was a very urgent need for acquiring land on a national basis. More and more Jews were going to Palestine, and owing to shortage of national land, they were congregating in the townsout of all proportion to those settling on the land. The speaker stressed the point that the over-crowding of the towns without the creation of a corresponding Jewish peasantry, would be fatal to the development of Pales-The acquisition of land by private individuals was not sufficient in itself, as their scope was limited: only by the national scheme were marshes being drained, bush country cleared, and so on. Hence, it was an obvious necessity for every Jew to contribute towards the fund for national land purchase, namely, the Jewish National Fund.

Mr. Natas then gave a humorous reading, which was much appreciated by the audience.

After tea Dr. Shein, by means of lantern slides, showed the great strides that had been made in the development of Palestine.

made in the development of Palestine. Flourishing settlements were seen where once, and not so long ago, there had been only marshy-lands. The tremendous growth of the towns, the introduction of numerous industrial ventures, and life in almost every sphere in Palestine, were illustrated. Dr. Shein commented adequately on each slide. He concluded with a short inspiring speech in which he appealed to the audience to help to strengthen the foundation of Eretz Israel: then, he felt, would we look forward to the

future with new hope, new power and energy.

Dr. Shein Addresses the Youth.

On Saturday evening a combined Youth mass meeting was held at the Zionist Hall under the auspices of the Cape Zionist Youth Executive. There was a fairly large attendance of junior Zionists from town and the Peninsula.

Mr. E. Kluk, President of the Executive, was in the chair, and in opening the meeting introduced Dr. Shein as a noted Zionist ambassador and much travelled emissary for the National cause.

Dr. Shein spoke on "Some Aspects of Palestinian Life" and the lecture was illustrated with a wealth of lantern slides depicting in a most graphic and picturesque form the story of Zionist upbuilding work in the country, from the kindergarten to the school and then to factory and field. Almost all the occupation of the Yishub were portrayed. Particularly striking were the pictures of contrast, the Emek as it is to-day and the malaria infested swamp it was just over a decade ago. Then was shown Huleh as it is to-day and one could well picture it five years hence. It undoubtedly left a lasting impression on those present.

Many popular Hebrew songs were sung during the evening, in which everybody present joined in. The meeting closed with a vote of thanks to Dr. Shein for his interesting address.
