Sium Hatorah at the Orphanage.

A Sium Hatorah took place at the Cape Jewish Orphanage on Sunday afternoon when the new Sefer Torah presented to the Orphanage Shul by Mr. S. Derman was publicly completed with full ancient ceremonial.

After Mincha Service in the Shul conducted by Rev. S. Kassel, the large gathering adjourned to the Hall where a reception was held.

Rabbi M. Ch. Mirvish delivered an address on the significance of the occasion, showing what a great part the Torah had played in the life of the Jewish people.

Apologies for non-attendance were received from Rev. A. P. Bender and Mr. Harry Harris.

The Mayor (Mr. L. Gradner) said it was the first time he had taken part in so important and holy a function. We were passing through difficult times but as long as the Torah was with us we would be protected. He thanked the donor, Mr. S. Derman, and also expressed thanks to Mr. Glass who had for years conducted the services in the Orphanage. He also referred to the presence of Mr. Wittenberg, who had been the first to suggest the building of an Orphanage in Cape Town.

The auctioning of the letters was then proceeded with, the Mayor, Mr. J. Weinreich and Mr. B. A. Crasnow acting as auctioneers. Rev. S. Kassel and Mr. A. P. Melmed were the scribes. When all the letters had been sold the new Sefer Torah was carried to the Chupah at the back of the hall by the Mayor. An adjournment was then made to the Shul, where the service was conducted by Cantor M. Katzin.

Four scrolls were taken out of the ark and borne to meet the new scroll under the Chupah. Cantor Katzin sang Psalm 24 and there was general rejoicing.

An adjournment was again made to the Shul, where Rabbi Kramer and Rabbi Grawitsky delivered inspiring addresses.

After Maariv Service Cantor Katzin gave some very beautiful renderings.

The proceedings terminated with a vote of thanks by Mr. J. Weinreich to the Mayor, the Rabbonim and all those who had helped to make the function a success.
