Empire Exhibition: South Africa, 1936.

Many novel features will be introduced at next year's South African Exhibition in Johannesburg. One of the most striking will undoubtedly be "Living Chess"; "human" pieces will be shifted about the squares of a giant board which will be laid out in the Open Air Theatre. Pretty girls in mediaeval costume will act as pawns while the roles of knights, bishops, kings and queens will be taken by Union amateur actors.

Green, gold and blue have been adopted as the official colours for the Exhibition.

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Bnoth Zion Association Reception.

On Monday night the Bnoth Zion Association gave a reception in the Zionist Hall to welcome Adv. M. Oblowitz, their President and leader of the South African delegation to the Wizo Conference, and to the Cape Town members of this delegation, namely, Mesdamec Gordon, Harris, Herbstein, Marks, Segal and Sloman.

A welcome was also extended to Mrs. M. Alexander.

Mrs. R. MOVSOVIC was in the chair, and apologised for the absence of the Acting-President, Mrs. S. Gesundheit, who was out of town, and of Rev. A. P. Bender, who was unable to be present.

It was a privilege, she said, to extend a welcome to Miss Oblowitz and the other delegates to the Wizo Conference. She assured Miss Oblowitz that the welcome was whole-hearted and sincere and that she had a large place in the affections of the members of the Association.

She also extended a very cordial welcome to Mrs. Alexander.

Mrs. M. ZUCKERMAN (Hon. Life President of the Association) said it afforded her great pleasure to congratulate Mr. and Mrs. Alexander on their marriage and to welcome Mrs. Alexander as a potential worker in the Association and as the wife of a man who was one of the best-known Zionists in the country, and a leading member in all Jewish institutions, and one who had championed the Jewish cause in Parliament for many years. She wished them great happiness and hoped Mrs. Alexander would place her great initiative and organising powers at the disposal of the Association which was always in need for workers.

Mrs. M. ALEXANDER, in expressing her thanks for the warm welcome extended to her admitted that she knew very little about Zionism but that she was very eager to learn and to co-operate with the Bnoth Zion Association in every way. She would be only too willing to give them any assistance of which she was capable. Her record in Australia was well-enough known.

Miss M. OBLOWITZ expressed her gratitude for the very kind welcome and warmth of the reception. She had gone to Palestine full of enthusiasm but had never expected to find the country so really beautiful. It was very satisfying, yet unsatisfying in the sense that one felt as if one could not have enough of it.

Miss Oblowitz went on to compare the Wizo Conference with the Conference for Women's Rights in Istanbul which she had

attended, and said that the full force of what the women of Palestine stood for was brought home to her in Istanbul. At the latter Conference the women of Palestine were represented by a delegation who showed that the women of Palestine knew what they wanted and were determined to get it.

The Jewish Women's Rights Association in Palestine was an organisation that was doing excellent work in seeing that the rights of women were not prejudiced.

Miss Oblowitz said that lack of enthusiasm was noticeable all over the Levant but enthusiasm was the key-note of the up-building of Palestine. Another thing characteristic of Palestine was the "dignity of labour," which was really the foundation on which the whole country was being built.

In conclusion she said that her visit to Palestine had been a very worth-while experience; no-one who visited the country could not but profoundly hope that Palestine would be built up as most people should like to see it.

Mrs. S. GORDON expressed her sincere appreciation of the warm words of welcome. She had found it difficult, she said, to leave Eretz Israel where she had been born and brought up, but the knowledge that in South Africa she would find friends who shared her feelings and duties had made her return here easier. She congratulated the Association on the excellent work done during the last two years; they had succeeded in transforming it into a real living movement and brought Eretz Israel nearer to the women of Cape Town.

Mrs. Gordon went on to speak of the Wizo Conference which, she said, she had found it a privilege to attend as a delegate. It had been an outstanding Conference in many respects and it was a revelation to see how determined the finest Jewish women of the world were, on building up Eretz Israel. The work of the Wizo had penetrated every corner of the country and covered a very wide field. Eretz Israel could only be built up on a sound and healthy basis if the women continued to work as they had been doing.

Miss H. Schwalbe and Mrs. J. Weinreich (accompanied by Miss Feinhols) contributed to the musical programme.

Mrs. S. Gordon sang two Palestinian songs.

Mrs. A. LIEBERMAN proposed a vote of thanks to the artists and speakers and the evening concluded with the singing of Hatikvah.

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
