Yehudi Menuhin, American boy genius of the violin, will give his first concert at the City Hall, Cape Town, on October 23rd. A boy in years, the highest honours are given him everywhere; scenes of frenzied enthusiasm to which he stirs his audiences are without counterpart. An irresistible magnet not alone to one, but to all sections of the public, Yehudi Menuhin is a universal artist.

On the technical side his playing in its phenomenal command of the violin reaches wizardry; supreme musicianship marks the inspiration of his interpretations as those of a veteran artist. Amazing as are his gifts, Yehudi remains the normal, ruggedly healthy boy; sports and games delight him; an expert swimmer, he drives a car skilfully through any traffic tangle.

Born in New York, Yehudi Menuhin, when nine months old, was taken by his parents to San Francisco. Loving music, but unable to employ a nurse, they tried carrying the baby along to a matinee concert by the San Francisco Orchestra. He enjoyed it to a point that not a peep was uttered. After that Yehudi became a regular attendant.

Aged three he begged for a violin, at four he began lessons on it, at seven he played a concerto as soloist with the San Francisco Orchestra, meeting immense success; one year later he profoundly interested New York in a recital there, afterwards sailing with his parents for Paris and study with Enesco.
