## The "Pageant of Southern Africa."

Hundreds of artists from all over the Union and Rhodesia are engaged in rehearsals for the "Pageant of Southern Africa," which will be produced in the arena of the Empire Exhibition, Johannesburg, between December 16th, 17th, 18th and 19th.

Arrangements have now been completed in terms of which the various contingents will reach Johannesburg from the main centres of the Union and Rhodesia some days previously to the commencement of the Pageant. They will be accommodated at the expense of the Exhibition and the task of finally coordinarting the various scenes will be taken in hand in a series of rehearsals by the Producer, Mr. A. van Gyseghem.

Meanwhile Mr. G. Knapp, the Property Master is engaged in scouring the country in search of the innumerable articles ranging from halberds to sedan-chairs, from live zebras to poke bonnets for Voortrekker women.

Mrs. Gardner has thought out many of the designs for costumes, and altogether a thousand are being made for the Pageant.

Besides the group of performers in the different scenes there will be about a thousand local performers forming the crowds. Numerous rehearsals are in progress and bid fair to provide effects entirely new in South Africa.. Mr. F. Klein, the illumination engineer of the Empire Exhibition who enjoys a European reputation on this highly specialised work is in charge of the wonderful sunrise effects, the "atmospheric" and spot-light installation for the great arena.

Dr. Gustav Preller, the celebrated S.A. historian, has finished the final script which will run into two hundred pages and sent it to the Exhibition authorities.

It has been arranged to use music extensively and there will be one or two special pieces composed for the occasion by Mr. John Connell, the Johannesburg City Organist, including a lullaby to be sung by one of the women performers. In addition there will be selected French and English folk music, Dutch folk music, psalms and hymns, and some of the gay songs of the inneties.

Mr. van Gyseghem said that among the well-known people in history who would play a part would be Bartholomew Dias, Van Riebeek, Simon van der Stel, Piet Uys, Louis Trichardt, Piet Retief, Gerrit Maritz, Cecil Rhodes, President Kruger, Louis Botha, Lady Anne Barnard, Chaka, and Andries Pretorious,

Close secrecy surrounds the details of the scenes as far as the public is concerned. Mr. Van Gyseghem has just reported on his visit to Rhodesia where he supervised several rehearsals of the pageant scenes.

He has been making frequent trips to Pretoria for the episode undertaken by that centre and in Johannesburg the rehearsals are taking place every week.

Delivery has been taken of hundreds of costumes completed by Mrs. Stirton, while the stage decorations prepared by Mr. Alfred Martin, the well-known artist, are nearly complete. So intense is the interest in this national undertaking that already bookings have been made. Arrangements have been completed whereby seats can be obtained at Pretoria as well as on the Rand.

Thousands of people are coming to Johannesburg from various parts of the country, shortly, to see the "Pageant of Southern Africa."
