## A Farewell to Mr. S. M. Levin.

A large and representative gathering was present at the Zionist Hall on Wednesday evening to bid farewell to Mr. S. M. Levin, previous to his departure for Port St. Johns, there to take up a position in the South African Civil Service.

Mr. Levin has for the past two years been the President of the Cape Zionist Youth Executive.

Mr. M. Meyerowitz was in the chair. He said that Mr. Levin had taken over the Presidency of the Executive at a difficult period, but had always exhibited unlimited zeal and enthusiasm. His influence in youth work was now felt all over South Africa.

Adv. J. Herbststein, speaking on behalf of the Dorshei Zion Association, said he much regretted Mr. Levin's departure. Mr. Levin had done much to bring about co-operation between the seniors and juniors and he hoped that he would soon be back in Cape Town again.

Dr. H. W. Altschul spoke on behalf of the Habonim. He stated it was to a large degree as a result of Mr. Levin's efforts that the strife which had taken place in other centres between Habonim and Zionist youth had been avoided in the Cape.

Mr. M. Goldberg, on behalf of Durban Zionist youth, said that Mr. Levin would be ever welcome in Natal, very near which he would now be working.

Mr. A. Roberts, on behalf of the Cape Zionist Youth Executive, spoke with praise of Mr. Levin's work among local societies.

Mr. Levin, in replying, thanked the speakers for their kind remarks. He then, in a humorous vein, detailed a few reminiscences of his Zionist work. He stated that he was proud to have been able to serve and that he would continue to do so.

During the course of the evening the following items were rendered: Miss M. Kaplan, piano solo; Miss D. Meyers, recitation; Mr. H. Rabinowitz, song; Mr. Levin himself sang an old favourite. The gathering concluded with the singing of a number of Hebrew songs and finally the Hatikvah.
