Zionist Socialist Party.

A public meeting on the Revisionist Menace was held at the Zionist Hall on Tuesday night, 23rd March. There was a good attendance.

Mr. M. Ben-Arie was in the chair and said that the N.Z.O. was outspokenly reactionary and their conception of a Zionist state was one where the Jewish masses would be deprived of their democratic rights and individual liberty.

Mr. Ch. Achron said that it was deplorable that people who pretend to believe in a Jewish State as the ultimate goal in Palestine should be determined to break the only governmental institution we have, viz. the Zionist Organisation. The reason why Jews should oppose the revisionist movement is that it is anti-democratic—Jews believe in a free Palestine built on principles of freedom of speech and press. The Jewish labourer would not agree to an unorganised system of labour which gives the opportunity for exploitation and private gain.

Mr. Z. Avin said that Revisionism was a disease from which many European nations were suffering to-day. The idea of following a "Fuhrer" had seized the minds of the Jewish youth in the countries where Jews were suffering most. It was the duty of every Zionist to help to combat the Revisionist menace.

The Zionist Organisation stands higher than party politics and is constituted of men of different shades of political opinion. Each group is able to exercise their influence on the political course of the movement. The man who broke the peace has now all of a sudden become the angel of peace. He and his followers must be shown up in their true light, so that the youth should not be bluffed by empty slogans.
