Conservatoire of Music in Palestine

NEW PROSPECTUS ISSUED

WE have received a copy of the new prospectus of the Palestine Conservatoire of Music and Dramatic Art in Jerusalem. This Conservatoire, which has no less distinguished a patron than the High Commissioner for Palestine, Sir Arthur Wauchope, is staffed by a number of teachers well qualified to impart musical knowledge of the first order.

The Conservatoire has several departments, where it is possible to receive tuition in the playing of a number of different instruments. The Conservatoire also has a department for pupils who join with the intention of studying music pedagogy, theory, harmony, counterpoint, composition, etc., for which special courses are provided. Special care is devoted in all the musical courses taught at the Palestine Conservatoire to children in order that they may acquire the elements of music by the use of methods calculated to awaken in their minds a love of music and playing. their minds a love of music and playing.

The term for the present year began on September 15 last, but special provision is made for pupils from outside Palestine who wish to study at the Conservatoire. The wish to study at the Conservatoire. The Conservatoire undertakes to facilitate the entry into Palestine of such pupils by obtaining for them a certificate to enter the country, if they can prove the genuineness of their intention to pursue musical studies.

The pupil is required to present, an plication to the Conservatoire, with a full statement of his name, address, date of birth and the assurance of the serious intention to study music in the country. He must also provide certain financial guarantees, which are fully explained in the prospectus.

The fees, a table of which are given in the prospectus, are singularly moderate for such a high standard of tuition as the teacher is capable of providing.

The principal of the Conservatoire is Dr. Emil Hauser, and the staff list includes a number of names that are world famous in their respective spheres.
