Yiddish Tales by a South African

"SCHWARTZ UN WEISS"—Nein Derzu-lungen Vun Dorem-Afrikaner Leben. By Rachmiel Feldman. Warsaw-Johannesburg, 1935.

THE reviewer must confess that he approached the reading of this little volume, which bears on its fly-leaf the legend, "Johannesburg-Warsaw," with some misgiving. Another graphomaniac? One more recruit to the ever-increasing army of our local writers, poets, novelists, and editors? The very appearance of the book, the excellence of its production put the reviewer on his guard. Warsaw printers and publishers can do nowadays with Johannesburg sterling. . . . burg sterling. . . .

A careful perusal, however, of the first few pages, at once convinced the reviewer that here was a man who writes not only with unusual sincerity, but also with great ability. The writer possesses a deep fount of the milk of human kindness, and the book is not altogether free from propaganda. But although Mr. Feldman is strongly predisposed in favour of the "ten submerged," although he is more than partial to the oppressed and exploited, this bias does not in pressed and exploited, this bias does not in the least mar the artistry of his pictures.

The book contains nine sketches, six of which deal with the life of the blacks, and three with that of the European. The former sketches are infinitely superior to the latter. "The Chasaneh" is an exquisite penpicture of rare beauty and merits a much wider circle of readers than it is likely to have in its Yiddish garb. Mr. Feldman writes with the deft and firm hand of the true artist, and is gifted with a simple, beautiful and convincing style. His characters are alive throughout. "Gold un dimanten"—a sketch from Jewish life—might have been omitted from the volume without much loss. There is too much moralising much loss. There is too much moralising and sermonising in it.

It is for the first time that the reviewer has met with a local production that forms a real contribution to Yiddish literature. The book is unlike anything else that has been written in Yiddish; it introduces a South African note into the symphony of Viddish lottors. Yiddish letters.

Irma Stern's artistic drawings add much to the beauty of the little volume.
