The inaugural evening of the second term of the Jewish People's College, which will take place on Tuesday, the 11th inst., at the New Public Library, promises to be an event of considerable interest. The subject ("A Cross-Section Through Johannesburg Jewry"), will be dealt with by five speakers who can claim authority in their respective spheres.

Dr. Sonnabend will, for the first time, make use of some interesting statistical facts gathered in the Johannesburg Survey; Dr. Wulf Sachs will analyse the main "psychological types" of this community; Rabbi Weiler will give his views on the ideological currents in local Jewry; Mr. Mierowsky will speak about the educational problems of the Golden City; Mr. Shur will talk about Yiddish poets, Yiddish writers and the Yiddish press in this town.

It is expected that many Johannes-burg citizens will take this opportunity of hearing what people say and think about them.

Artisan Law in Lithuania

Kaunas (Lithuania), July 17th.

THE new regulations of the Polish Government which restrict the possibility of artisans and requires the registration of only fully qualified artisans has been followed by other governments in Eastern Europe. Knowing how adversely these regulations reacted on the Jewish workers of Poland, the promulgation of a similar law in Lithuania, caused very considerable anxiety and alarm amongst the Lithuanian Jewry. After certain representations which have been made to the Lithuanian Government, it is now announced that the Lithuanian Cabinet has decided to invite a representative of the Jews on this special Commission and has communicated with the Lithuanian ORT as the authoritative body which deals with matters affecting artisans, to send its representative as the Jewish member of this Commission. Advo-cate Makofsky, a member of the Lithuanian ORT has accordingly been appointed as its representative.
