

## Baruch Zuckerman in the Copperfields

### Warm Response for Keren Hayesod

AN extremely cordial reception was accorded to Mr. Baruch Zuckerman by the Zionists of this territory.

Mr. Zuckerman arrived at Broken Hill on the 4th September by plane on his way to Palestine. From Broken Hill he proceeded to N'Dola by train where he was met at the station by Mr. H. Shulman, who motored him out to Luanshaya, where substantial contributions were secured from the few local Jewish residents.

Mr. Zuckerman arrived at N'Kana on Monday morning, 7th September. The local community assembled at the N'Kana Hotel to hear the distinguished visitor. Maurice Gersh, who was in the chair, introduced the speaker to the meeting, and also recounted his impressions of his recent visit to Eretz Israel during the period of the disturbances. Mr. Zuckerman then delivered an extremely lucid and impressive address on the present situation in Eretz Israel. An enthusiastic audience listened with close attention to the facts and figures which were so eloquently outlined to them by the speaker.

At the conclusion of Mr. Zuckerman's address, the chairman made an appeal for contributions to the Keren Hayesod. An excellent response was forthcoming from those present, and a substantial total was reached. What was a memorable meeting in the annals of local Jewry, terminated with a vote of thanks by Mr. S. Rabinowitz, of Bulawayo, to the speaker and the chairman.

The following day Mr. Zuckerman was motored out by Messrs. Gersh and Diamond to Elisabethville, where he inaugurated the Keren Hayesod campaign in the Belgian Congo.

On his return journey to Broken Hill, Mr. Zuckerman stopped to address a meeting at N'Dola. Mr. H. Shulman presided over a meeting of the community held at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Moss Dobkins. After an eloquent address by Mr. Zuckerman, an appeal was made for contributions to the Keren Hayesod, and a satisfactory response was forthcoming.

Mr. Zuckerman left the following day for Broken Hill in order to join the Imperial Airways plane.

## RABBI SCHWARTZ AT VRYBURG

### Cordial Reception by Community

ON Sunday, the 13th inst., Rabbi Schwartz, who was joined by Mr. S. N. Herman, visited Vryburg, where the local community assembled in full force at the Masonic Hall, and the visitors were accorded an extremely cordial reception.

Mr. S. Lieberthal, chairman of the Congregation, presided and introduced the visitors. The first speaker was Mr. Herman, who gave an account of the achievements of the Keren Hayesod in Eretz Israel, and the possibilities there existed for the consolidation and extension of the Jewish position. Rabbi Schwartz gave a graphic review, punctuated with personal reminiscences, of the condition of Jewry in various countries of the Galuth. The only source of genuine optimism in regard to the Jewish future, he concluded, was Eretz Israel.

At the conclusion of the two addresses, questions on the present situation in Eretz Israel were put by members of the audience, to which the visitors replied. Exceedingly generous contributions were then forthcoming for the Keren Hayesod. Dr. M. Getz and Rev. L. I. Slonim proposed hearty votes of thanks to the speakers.

The following day, a thorough canvass of the town and district was made, with the result that Vryburg Jewry has doubled the amount previously contributed by it to the Keren Hayesod. Occasion was also taken to visit Taungs, Thoming and other parts of the district, where further substantial contributions were forthcoming from the Jewish residents.

Special thanks are due to Rev. L. I. Slonim, and Messrs. S. Lieberthal, J. Perl and I. Spitz, for their assistance in the conduct of the campaign.

During their stay in Vryburg, Rabbi Schwartz and Mr. Herman were the guests of Rev. and Mrs. L. I. Slonim.

At a social gathering of the community, held at the conclusion of the campaign, the visitors availed themselves of the opportunity to organise a Zionist Youth group for Vryburg. The following provisional committee was elected: Rev. L. I. Slonim and Mr. E. Hechter (representing the seniors); Misses Lieberthal and Benjamin; Mr. S. Lieberthal (jun.).

It is as well, however, to maintain a sense of proportion, which, alas, many of our co-religionists fail to do. We have to remember that one of the great English traditions is that of free speech, and this right is jealously guarded. As everyone who has the slightest acquaintance with this country knows, the greatest latitude is and has been given for centuries past to people to air their views. The famous open-air platforms in Hyde Park are the wonder of all foreigners, and they cannot understand why anyone in a Royal Park under police protection is allowed, for example, publicly to advocate the abolition of the monarchy, preach communism, fascism or any of the other isms which one can hear nightly advocated.

Enthusiasts, forgetting this, and also forgetting that to a magistrate dealing daily with disturbances of the peace anti-Semitic libels are just an ordinary offence, rush into print criticising the benches because they do not deal with these defamers as Hitler would deal with them. In these modern days, in England at any rate, people are seldom sent to prison for petty offences and even more seldom for a first offence.

THE sympathy of the community will go out to the Chief Rabbi, Dr. Hertz, on the tragic death of his eldest son, Dr. Daniel Henry Hertz, at the age of 26. Dr. Hertz, Junr., had a brilliant scholastic career in medicine, and a bright future was foreseen for him.

Another New Year is beginning. Once more we look to the future and hope the coming year will be a better one than the last. Once more Jewry hopes for the best, however dark the clouds may be. Once more my wish is "May you be inscribed for a happy life."
