THE first concert given by the newly-augmented Johannesburg Symphony Orchestra proved the musical event of the 1937 season. Vast numbers of music-goers thronged the City Hall on Tuesday night. With a better orchestra at his command than he had ever conducted here before, Mr. Joseph Trauneck proved himself more than equal to the occasion. The eagerly awaited Beethoven's Piano Concerto No. 3 succeeded in activities even the most hoven's Piano Concerto No. 3 succeeded in satisfying even the most exacting taste. Mr. Hambourg was given ample opportunity in the solo passages for technical display and sensitive interpretation. He is a significant who knows how to extract the sensitive interpretation. He is a pianist who knows how to extract the fullest value from his instrument. The orchestral background served to throw his playing into the necessary relief.

An interesting item was Wagner's "Tannhauser" overture, with which the programme opened. Here the orchestra convinced that its reorganisation had been a step forward in musical history in Johannesburg. In the rendering of Schubert's Symphony No. 7, a high plane of orchestral exposition was achieved.

To Mr. Trauneck and Mr. Hambourg, who set a new standard for musical achievements here, the greatest credit is due.

AN APPEALING JEWISH PLAY

The mingling of the tear and the laugh—so characteristic of Jewish life—was the main feature behind the appealing domestic comedydrama, presented by Sarah Sylvia and her company at the Standard Theatre during the week. "The Three Sisters" one of Leon Kobrin's best plays, is an example of the keen insight of this popular American playwright into the Jewish life of the new world.

The play revolves over a simple theme — a Jewish home in which there live three sisters and a brother. The eldest sister, Miriam, is deeply concerned that her sisters should be married and happy, her own life, one full of disappointment, having lost all interest for herself.

The plot rises to high dramatic moments which are well played up to by the dominating character, Miss Sarah Sylvia, in the role of Miriam. The delightful winning simplicity and quietness of her acting stamps Sarah Sylvia as a true interpreter of the subtleties of Jewish life.

Boris Abramoff in the role of Charlie Wasserfoigel, contributed a remarkable piece of acting. It was he who provided most of the comedy, and his appearance during the acts met with much acclamation. "Uncle Nochim," the old and benevolent family uncle, played by Mr. H. Hirsch, portrayed the warmhearted, elderly Jew with his little paculiarities but beaming with goodheartedness and kindness. Eve Shapiro, the 'modern lassie' in the play, took the part of the coquette with much ease although her pronunciation was too Anglicised.

All in all, the play was a welcome contribution to the cultural activities of the local Jewish community, the music, song and dance being in harmany with the plot and doing much to add to a pleasant evening.
