An Elmer Rice Play

Brilliant Production By Local Amateurs

Elmer ruce is undoubtedly one of the slickest of modern dramatists. His plays are right up to the minute in atmosphere and events which occur all round us. It is not surprising, then, that the characters he depicts are all people whom we know fairly intimately.

Witnessing an Elmer Rice play, therefore, is a personal experience for every member of the audience. In the case of "Counsellor-at-Law", — the play produced by the newly formed Playmakers at the Library Theatre during the week-end — the experience was also an enjoyable and a thrilling one,

In the first place the cast was ideally chosen. From the leading character to the smallest, there was not a note of discord. Everyone played naturally. An extraordinarily fine performance was given by Sidney Witkin as the counseilor. He was on the stage most of the time and his strong personality pervaded almost every scene, It was a long part, but Witkin was word-perfect throughout. For one who had never previously appeared on the stage, the performance was notable indeed.

The mother of the counsellor, portrayed by Esther Lutrin, was outstanding. It was a carefully studied and subtle picture of an elderly lady, proud of her son who had long outstepped her in the race of modern life. A notable performance, too, was given by Lilian Lazarus in the unsympathetic part of a wife whose thoughts were mainly concentrated upon herself. Juel Rodack gave an admirable character study of a young revolutionary. It was a short performance but a telling one. The telephone chatter of Sylvia Canter, with its natural ease and banter, was nost amusing.
