

JEWISH EMERGENCY APPEAL FOR REFUGEES AND ORT-OZE

The Joint Emergency Appeal for Refugees and the Ort-Oze, which is being launched in South which is being launched in South Africa on the 1st February, will be headed by the eminent British statesman, the Rt. Hon. Lord Marley, D.S.C., D.L., J.P., and Lady Marley, who have accepted the leadership of the Campaign.

The visitors are expected in Johannesburg on Sundav after-noon, 22nd inst., at 3.50 p.m. On Monday they will be the guests at a special Civic Lun-cheon to be held in their honour at the Langham Hotel. The Mayor will preside.

Lord and Lady Marley will spend some time in the city. Lord Marley, who is a non-Jew, was first attracted to the problems of Jewry through his work on behalf of European minorities, and for the past decade he has closely identified himself with many important Jewish movements.

Lady Marley, who is a daughter of the late Sir Hugh Gilzean Reid, has always taken a great interest in politics and social problems, particularly in questions pertaining to child welfare, nutrition and nousing. She has co-operated with Lord Marley in his efforts on behalf of minorities and has particularly studied the work of the Jewish Health Organisation, the Oze.


JEWISH OPERA AT THE STANDARD THEATRE
